PRACTISING SECOND STATE MUTATION

The Rule

After the definite article **an** 'the' we change the first sound of a feminine noun. We make the same change to the first sound of an adjective that comes immediately after a feminine noun.

Here are the changes

We call the unchanged spelling (before the arrow) 'First State'. When the sound is changed (after the arrow) we call it 'Second State'.

p > b

t > d

c, k, q > g

b > v

d > dh

g > zero (g disappears), but we add **w** in front of any exposed o-vowel or u-vowel.

m > v

f > **f** (but *pronounced* v)

It is true that **s** pronounced with a hiss (true s-sound) often changes to **s** pronounced with a buzz (z-sound). But technically this is *not* Second State mutation. It happens with masculine nouns as well. Sometimes even when there is no preceding word at all. You'll automatically get the hang of pronouncing **s** correctly as you progress.

Some more practice for you

Put the Cornish words together, making any necessary Second State changes, and say what each phrase means. *Warning:* Second State mutation won't apply in every case! Check the Rule.
