## Notes:

Historically in Kernowek most place names have been made up of two elements an initial (Generic) element which describes the place in question such as "Pen (head)" followed by a second element (Qualifier) which adds more detail / desciption to the name such as "Goon (Down)".

Not all names are made up in this way, some are just singular elements such as Gweek (Gwyk – Forrest)

Some also have plant names included such as Pencalenik (Pen – Head & Calenik – Holly)

The inclusion of "Saints" names is also seen often in place names in Kernow such as;

- Maucan St Mawgan
- Guidian Gwithian
- Austoll St Austell
- Berion St Buryan

The inclusion of English elements into place names has also made it harder perhaps to identify the original Cornish elements within the historical names of places in Kernow, so when looking at place names it is best to resurch the Cornish name for the place and not simply attempt to translate the name as it is used today on maps. Lately the Cornish name for a place is included in many of the roadside signs by Cornwall council.
