- married Doreen Parsons in 1967 celebrated our 50th wedding anniversary last year by going to Ireland/Northern Ireland. I managed to play a round of golf at the Royal Portrush Golf Club, where the 2019 British Open will be held.
- we have 3 sons: Shawn (Laura Vecchio) and family live in Southlake, Texas. Scott (Heidi Horine) live in Frederick, Maryland. James (Megan McPhee) live in Yarmouth, Maine.
- I retired from Bell Canada in 1997 after 27 years of service. Claim to fame was that I was a co-leader of

2021 Sept Society Gathering

With the decreasing COVID-19 numbers, increase in the availability of the vaccine, and decreasing restrictions, we think a Fall 2021 Annual Gathering is possible.

June McCaskill Miles, Rachel McCaskill Miles and Mary Anne Scott all three of Sumter, SC have graciously agreed to help plan and host the 2021 Gathering. Obviously, they are just in the planning phase, but we would like to get the word out about our 2021 Gathering. A date has not been set but they are planning for Fall 2021. A location has been picked and will be in the hometown of the hosts, Sumter, SC. More information will be distributed soon.





Location: Known as the Gamecock City, Sumter lies near the geographic center of the state of South Carolina. Sumter is 100 miles west of Myrtle Beach's Grand Strand and 175 miles east of the Blue Ridge Mountains. <u>Columbia</u>, the state capital, is about 45 miles to the west, and Charleston is around 100 miles to the south.

History: <u>Sumter</u> has a colorful history stretching back more than three hundred years. In the 1740s, the first English-speaking settlers arrived to establish roots along the banks of the Wateree River. The "Carolina Backcountry," as it was then known, became a predominantly agricultural area originally part of <u>Craven County</u>, later <u>Claremont County</u>. <u>Sumter District (county)</u> was established effective January 1, 1800. When the state capital was moved from Charleston in 1786, <u>Statesburg</u>, located on U.S. Highways 76 and 378, missed being elected the new capital by one vote. According to tradition, Statesburg (now Stateburg) was also considered as the location for the United States Military Academy, now at West Point.

The city of Sumter is the County Seat and the largest city of Sumter County, the eighth-largest metropolitan area in the state of South Carolina. Incorporated as Sumterville in 1845, the city's name was shortened to Sumter in 1855. It has grown and prospered from its early beginnings as a plantation settlement.

The city and county of Sumter bear the name of <u>Brigadier General Thomas Sumter</u>, the "Fighting Gamecock" of the American Revolutionary War. His place in U.S. history is secure as an ardent Patriot and military genius. Brigadier General Sumter was one of the models for Mel Gibson's character in the 2000 movie, "The Patriot" (along with Francis Marion and Andrew Pickens, also from South Carolina), and his service to his country continued for the duration of his long life.
