TRACKS OVERVIEW

TRACKS (TRent Aboriginal Cultural Knowledge and Science) is an educational program which provides hands-on experiences for youth interested in the intersections of Indigenous and western sciences.

TRACKS is based out of the Indigenous Environmental Studies and Sciences Program (IESS) of Trent University, under the umbrella of the Kawartha World Issues Centre and supported by First People's House of Learning. TRACKS consists of two distinct but connected programs: Outreach & Education and Oshkwazin Indigenous Youth Leadership Program.

MISSION STATEMENT & VISION

TRACKS is dedicated to educating young people to be able to address increasingly complex environmental issues by creating and delivering culturally relevant programming which combines Indigenous and western sciences. Through this programming, we aim to build stronger community through partnership with First Nations, school boards and other non-profits in the greater Peterborough area.



To give youth the ability to relate Indigenous teachings and knowledge with western scientific concepts through a "two-eved" way of exploring, seeing and educating



To contribute to a continuous education stream which combines Indigenous and western science from the elementary to post-secondary level



To facilitate spaces where intergenerational knowledge and teachings can be shared



To empower all youth to be leaders in their schools, groups and communities regardless of their age, gender and background



To provide opportunities for youth to engage with the outdoor environment in a hands-on and interactive way



TRACKS: OUTREACH & EDUCATION



TRACKS Outreach & Education runs a wide variety of educational programs throughout the year for youth ages 6-12 including outreach activities, in-school workshops and PA-day camps. All of our programming combines Indigenous and Western scientific principles.

The Outreach and Education program provides hands-on experiences for youth interested in the intersections of Indigenous and western sciences. This program provides opportunities for youth to learn math, science and cultural teachings in relation to the environment in meaningful and educationally stimulating ways. Outreach and Education offers a wide variety of programming in which both traditional ecological knowledge and western scientific perspectives are given voice.

Our geographical area includes five school boards and four First Nation communities within a 100km range of Peterborough, Ontario. Outreach and Education caters to youth between ages 6 to 12 and provides spaces where these Indigenous knowledges and Western science intersect and collaborate in meaningful and understandable ways. In order to attain these goals, TRACKS Outreach and Education runs a wide variety of programs throughout the year such as in-school workshops. PA-day camps, week long summer camps and other outreach activities.

Half of our summer camps are exclusively for Indigenous youth from First Nation communities in the surrounding Peterborough region and are fully subsidized to ensure accessibility and high enrollment. The rest of our summer camps are open to Indigenous, non-Indigenous and newcomer youth living in and around Peterborough and are run through a pay-what-you-can system. The primary goal of our summer camp programming is to provide youth with hands-on educational experiences outside of the classroom that recognize the importance of integrating and highlighting multiple knowledge systems within outdoor education. Our programming provides spaces and support systems to help youth develop science skills, critical thinking abilities, and an understanding of science that affirms, and contributes to, their cultural and personal experiences. During our week-long camps, students are able to fully immerse themselves in the TRACKS mandate, giving them more time to seek mentorship from instructors and become inspired to pursue further education and careers in E-STEM fields.



TRACKS: OSHKWAZIN

TRACKS Oshkwazin is a leadership program for Indigenous high school aged youth. TRACKS Oshkwazin aims to empower Indigenous youth to utilize their traditional ecological knowledge to pursue careers in E-STEM fields.



TRACKS Oshkwazin is a leadership program for Indigenous high school aged youth. Inspired by the mandate of IESS program. TRACKS Oshkwazin aims to empower Indigenous youth to utilize their traditional ecological knowledge to pursue further education and careers in E-STEM fields. "Oshkwazin" is an Anishinaabemowin word that means "to light your internal fire".

In 2016, TRACKS applied to the Ontario Trillium Foundation (OTF) - Youth Opportunity Fund (YOF). The successful application allowed for the TRACKS Oshkwazin project to be created with a budget of \$398,976.00 over four years. The TRACKS program pause took place shortly after the launch of Oshkwazin and meant that the first year of funding was not completely spent. The remaining funds were approved by YOF to be carried over into the second and third year of the grant.

After the pause. Oshkwazin worked over the summer with staff to build new curriculum, and partnerships in Peterborough and surrounding communities. Oshkwazin now runs a series of youth groups with community partner collaborations throughout the school year. Youth group programming takes place during lunch hours, after-school and on PA Days. Oshkwazin continues with outreach during the year to promote youth leadership by attending events in both communities and urban spaces.

Through our Oshkwazin programming, TRACKS aims to:

- Develop confidence and skills for Indigenous leadership
- Encourage youth to connect with their communities
- Create a space that youth can receive traditional teachings and learn about Indigenous issues
- Connect youth to community-based role models


