

Key Emergency Procedures – Code GREEN: Minor, can complete trip or evacuate by foot	 Participants treated and able to safely continue (Examples: Mild reaction to insect stings, minor asthma attack, dislocated finger contusions). Emergency strategy – refer to the Emergency Response Card. One Guide Trips: Call management or back-up person, or send Code GREEN message if no Cell Continue the trip. Participant(s) who required treatment are monitored, keep them close to, and assisted by guide as necessary Arrange any further care as needed. Two Guide Trips: In addition to the procedures for one guide trips, the 2nd guide will: 2nd guide assists with the emergency and group management 2nd guide accompanies participants in any escape route evacuation while lead guide continues trip with remaining participants if safe to do so 	Key Emer- gency Proce- dures – Code OR- ANGE: not life threatening, but requires evacuation Options: 1. Emergency strategy – refer to the Emergency Response Card. One guide trips: Call management or back-up person, or send Code RED message if no Cell Heli-vac patients from emergency site Evacuate rest of group from the emergency site Manage the group and ensure everyone is OK Two Guide Trips: 2nd guide assists with the emergency and group management 2nd guide manages any evacuation by foot while Lead guide monitors patient 	Overdue trips	 Trips are considered overdue when: Trips fail to check-in with management or back-up person within 1 hour from expected arrival at take out point Procedure for overdue trips Management or back-up person calls guides' cell phone Management or back-up person tracks trips progress If trip as been stationary for over 45 minutes and no emergency activation has been received, call emergency services
