Welcome to our May funding Gazette

CYA would like to acknowledge a wide range of sources of information. We regularly look at funding information from NAVCA, Active Cumbria, NCVO, Merseyside Funding Portal, Get Grants and Focus on Funding from Cumbria CVS. CVS will do a search for funding for your specific project via Grantfinder. Contact: cvsfunding@cumbriacvs.org.uk

There are significant opportunities to apply for grants and trusts but now more than ever the competition is stiff and you need to take time to read the guidelines carefully for each of the charitable trusts and foundations and only apply to those where you do meet the criteria.

Funders tell us that over 30% of the applications they receive don't meet their criteria and they waste time reading through them and rejecting them but more importantly the organisations have wasted their time compiling the application and the supporting documents only for them to be consigned to the bin.

Cumbria Youth Alliance can help you with your funding applications -we can supply you with up to 10 potential funding sources that are a good match for your organisation. We can assist by being a second pair of eyes to read through your applications before you send them away and we can be a referee for your application if we have worked together and we are aware of your work.

Beffer Tomorrows

Cumbria's High Sheriff, David Beeby, is encouraging people to think about a career in youth work by offering fully funded training and grants to support salary costs.

Better Tomorrows is a three-year programme which aims to substantially increase the number of young people having access to support from youth workers to help them reach their full potential.

The unique initiative provides accredited training via Cumbria Youth Alliance and offers grants of up to £25,000 to community organisations setting up or providing new youth work opportunities for local people. The Better Tomorrows Fund, administered by Cumbria Community Foundation, is now open for applications.

Better Tomorrows aims to invest $\pounds I$ million over the next three years into quality youth work training and provision. Funding has been secured from individuals, businesses and funders, including Cumbria Community Foundation, Francis C Scott Charitable Trust, Four Acre Trust, LLWR, Cumbria's Police and Crime Commissioner, BAE Systems, CCL Secure, Carr's Group, CGP Publications, Iggesund, James Walker and Lloyd Motors.

The training, Cumbria Youth Alliance, will lead to Level 2 and Level 3 qualifications in Youth Work and around 150 people are expected to access the learning, which will be delivered through a mix of online and face-to-face sessions. Participants will be supported during and after their training as well as in their youth work settings.

CCC Holiday Activities and Food Programme

Expression of Interest for Cumbria County Council Holiday Activities and Food Programme 2022 (HAF)

Please read the guidance on Holiday Activity Provision before completing this application. It can be during the day, evening, or weekends. If you can offer less, please talk to our HAF coordinator before undertaking the application.

Providers of HAF Activities should provide the following:

- Healthy meals: holiday activities organisers must provide at least one hot healthy meal a day and must meet the School Food Standards throughout the day.
- Enriching activities: holiday clubs must provide fun and enriching activities
 that provide children with opportunities to develop or consolidate skills and
 knowledge and improve their wellbeing.
- Provide physical activities which contribute to the Chief Medical Officer Physical Activity Guidelines.
- Nutritional education: holiday clubs must improve children's knowledge and awareness of healthy eating and offer advice and training to parents on how to source, prepare and cook nutritious and low-cost food.
- Signposting and referrals: clubs must be able to provide information signposting or referrals to other services and support that would benefit the children who attend their provision and their families.
- Provide on request policies and procedures: clubs must be able to demonstrate and explain their safeguarding arrangements and have relevant and appropriate policies and procedures in place in relation to safeguarding, health and safety and contingency planning in respect of Covid.

Guidelines:

Cost should be in the range of no more than £20 per day per young person for activities and £5.00 per day for a nutritious hot meal giving a total price of no more than £25.00 per day per young person.

There are exceptions to this funding such as provision of transport costs or supporting children with additional needs but please discuss with your HAF lead before undertaking the application.

The HAF programme targets young people with a free school meal entitlement, or those children deemed vulnerable, NEET or with SEND who are of school age 5-16 and activities must last at least 4 hours per day and include a hot nutritious meal in line with school food guidance.

You can only use the HAF monies for these young people, but you can have paying places for those who are not eligible for the HAF funding.

Tesco Bags of Help

Bags of Help is the Trust's exciting local grant scheme where the money raised from the government's 5p bag charge is being used for grants to improve local parks, hold community events, support sports groups and more. The grants are managed by the community charity Groundwork UK. Projects range from improving community buildings and outdoor spaces to buying new equipment, training coaches or volunteers and hosting community events.

What types of projects will Bags of Help Fund?

Can provide grants of up to £1000 to support local projects focused on children and young people. This may cover a large mixture of local causes, some examples being as follows:

- Mental Health support for children and young people. (Including impacts due to COVID-19)
- Outdoor activities, such as sport and green spaces
- Non-statuary educational activities supporting, widening and rebuilding educational support networks for children, i.e sport, exercise and arts.
- Young carers
- Bereavement counselling, specifically offering support to children that have lost family members due to COVID-19
- Child poverty, this could include providing free activities, food/educational packs
- Vulnerable/at risk children.
- Other local causes supporting children and young people will also be considered.

Bags of help can fund 100% of your project costs so match funding is not necessary. If you have secured additional funding there is no limit to what this amount can be, and any funding provided by Bags of Help can form part of your wider project costs.

Your project may be stand-alone or discrete, self-contained part of a larger scheme or part of a phased project. You will need to complete your project within twelve months of a receipt of the grant.

ASDA Foundation

Green Token Giving

Designed to support small, local grassroots organisations, supporting local people in the local community surrounding Asda stores. They do not support large national charities. Nominations need to be for local causes that are having a positive impact on the local community and helping to improve lives.

(Currently not taking place in stores but there is a new digital version of this activity)

Empowering Local Communities Grant

A relatively new Asda Foundation grant for local groups aimed at supporting a broad range of activities which contribute towards transforming communities and improving lives. There is currently a bespoke criteria to support refugees arriving to the UK. The guidance for this is available via the following website www.asdafoundation.org/how-to-apply

U18 Better Starts Grant

A relatively new Asda Foundation Grant for local groups aimed at supporting a wide range of activities for children under the age of 18 which specifically target on transforming communities and improving children's lives. Read the guidance for this here www.asdafoundation.org/how-to-apply

Match Funding

They encourage all colleagues to fundraise for charities. Asda colleagues can claim up to £300.00 per year to match the funds they have raised themselves.

Emergency

The Asda Foundation can provide assistance during times of emergency. This is inclusive of personal level emergencies, i.e house fires, or community wide disasters.

Morrisons foundation

Grant Funding

The Morrisons Foundation awards grant funding for charity projects which make a positive difference in local communities. Grants are available to fully fund projects up to £25,000.

The Morrisons Foundation will not generally consider applications which are related to:

- 3. Grants, bursaries etc. to individuals
- 4. Expeditions recreation or overseas travel
- 5. Fundraising events
- 6. Work that is primarily the statutory responsibility of public agencies
- 7. Promotion of religious or political messaging
- 8. Event sponsorship
- 9. Advertising, promotion or marketing of events or services
- 10. Overseas appeals
- 11. Conferences or seminars
- 12. Equipment which will be retained by individuals rather than the charity
- 13. Animal charities, unless the objective is to improve the lives of vulnerable or disadvantaged people
- 14. Projects being delivered outside England, Scotland or Wales
- 15. Sports-based charities, unless the objective is to improve the lives of vulnerable or disadvantaged people
- 16. Projects which could harm the reputation of the foundation.

Various grants to local charities, community groups and social enterprises.

Projects that they will fund:

- Projects where the majority of people who will benefit are disadvantaged
- Groups working with children where the majority are disadvantaged or have special needs
- Groups with 12 months or less running costs in unrestricted reserves
- Groups operating within the county of Cumbria (Except Beckburn Windfarm and Cumberland Building Society Community Fund – please refer to the fund pages for the full area of benefit)
- Groups with a registered address and/or local voluntary management committee or Board of Trustees in Cumbria (Except Beckburn Windfarm and Cumberland Building Society Community Fund – please refer to fund pages for the full area of benefit)
- Core costs and overheads for your organisation
- Salaries and equipment purchases
- Capital projects that meet our fund criteria

Projects they won't fund:

- Animal welfare
- Contact boxing, except where donor-advised
- Businesses and personal profit
- Deficit funding
- General large appeals
- Medical research and equipment, except where donor-advised
- Activities that are normally the responsibility of central or local government
- Awards from the same fund in a 12 month period
- Projects which duplicate an existing service in an area
- Fundraisers and fundraising events
- Advancement of religion including buildings solely for religious purposes, except where donor-advised
- Party political activities
- Retrospective funding unless through a disaster appeal
- Purchase of vehicle, except where donor-advised
- Groups or individuals who have not returned their monitoring form
- Beautification projects, except where donor-advised
- National organisations that do not have a local presence within Cumbria

Eligibility Criteria is as follows for Volunteer-led organisations, registered charities and CIOs:

- Have a management committee with a minimum of three unrelated members
- Have a bank or building society account in the name of the organisation/group, with a minimum of two unrelated bank signatories.
- Have charitable aims, evidenced by the governing document.
- Provide evidence of good governance practices and sound financial management including being registered with the Charity Commission, Community Amateur Sports Club (CASC) or other governing body, depending on the size of the organisation, annual accounts.
- Register with the Charity Commission if your charitable organisation is based in England or Wales and has over £5,000 income per year.
- For Social enterprises, CIC and other companies:
- Have a management committee with a minimum of three directors, or four directors if two are related. The majority of directors should be unpaid.
 Directors should have equal voting rights
- Have a bank or building society account in the name of the organisation/company, with a minimum of two unrelated bank signatories.
- Have clear charitable purposes and a defined social benefit, evidenced by Articles of Association and community benefit statement. Please also supply your CIC 34 report (if this has been made available).
- Provide evidence of good governance practices and sound financial management, including having a recognised status (e.g. a company limited by guarantee), and be registered with the necessary relevant body (e.g. Companies House, CIC regulator, annual accounts.
- Ensure an Asset Lock body is named and has objectives both charitable and like the CIC, ensuring benefit to the community

cumberland Building Society community fund

Available to variety of good causes which include local charities, neighbourhood groups, schools and voluntary organisations. Provide funding for community projects with a strong focus on activities that help those less fortunate, support education and/or encourage community integration.

Donations usually range from £50 to £1,500; however, funding of up to £10,000 can be awarded to specific educational projects or community events that involve a significant number of people. For applications of less than £50, or for raffle prizes for community events, please contact the manager of your local branch.

Lake District Communities Fund

There is a total of £10,000 available this financial year, to help projects that will contribute to the sustainability or wellbeing of resident communities. Grants of up to £2,000 for each of the five Distinctive Areas within the National Park will be awarded on a competitive basis. The applicant criteria is as follows:

- I. **Must** be able to show a 'fit' with the Vision for the National Park: www.lakedistrict.gov.uk/caringfor/nationalparkvision
- 2. **Must** be able to show a 'fit' to one or more of the priorities for the Lake District Communities Fund (listed in priority order for this distinctive area):
 - Improving sustainable transport, access and recreation opportunities (e.g. addressing the health and well-being agenda)
 - Developing high quality public realm and amenities
 - Improving habitats, wildlife, and water quality and enhancing landscape management
 - Celebrating and maintaining the historic environment, and supporting the Lake District National Park bid for World Heritage Site status.
 - Supporting carbon reduction and climate change adaptation.
- 3. **Must** be able to show evidence of local need and or community support through evidence of local community consultation. Examples include:-
 - a parish or community plan
 - local survey
 - letters of support
 - other sources of evidence relevant to the project.
- 4. Shows clear outcomes or legacies for the community in the long term, in relation to one or all of:-
 - it supports the future viability and vitality of a community or communities
 - it helps ensures future viability and vitality of services or facilities
 - it ensures future protection and enhancement of local landscape/biodiversity/wildlife
 - it has a neutral or positive impact on climate change.
- 5. Projects have a clear plan to ensure the legacy of the project (such as future maintenance, repair and replacement) so it is self-sustaining once initial grant has been invested.
- 6. Can demonstrate an attempt to securing at least 20 per cent match funding (cash or in kind) includes own fundraising (where community led or not for profit) and 50 per cent match funding or investment where business or commercial led.
- 7. Demonstrate the best possible financial return and impact on the ground for the grant awarded.
- 8. Projects should seek to demonstrate added value i.e. use of volunteers, in kind contributions, promotion of the Lake District National Park.

cumbria Action for Sustainability—Zero carbon fund

The Zero Carbon Cumbria Grassroots Community Fund is a small funding pot which the National Lottery Climate Action fund has given to Cumbria Action for Sustainability to support local initiatives to raise awareness of climate change and reduce carbon emissions. The funding contributes to the work of the Zero Carbon Cumbria Partnership and there is a total amount of £100,000 available over a five-year period.

Small (£200 - £750), Medium (£750 - £2000) and a small number of larger grants (£2,000 - £10,000) will be awarded to local groups until 2025.

Early intervention and preventative work to support positive transitions to adulthood for children and young people experiencing challenging circumstances. Funding covers all of Cumbria, including Eden District. Multi year awards typically up £20k p/a but varies dependent on details. Revenue and capital. Encourage full cost recovery where project costs requested.

The Francis C Scott Charitable Trust awards over £1 million in grants every year to charitable organisations operating in Cumbria and the very north of Lancashire.

Our core purpose is to support charitable organisations who enable young people up to the age of 24 in Cumbria & North Lancashire experiencing challenging circumstances to thrive. We are particularly interested in effective approaches to addressing the needs of children, young people and young adults by:

- raising aspirations and supporting personal development
- inclusive practice
- improving wellbeing and mental health
- improving sector effectiveness

When considering whether to apply for a grant from the Harold and Alice Bridges Charity, applicants should consider the following criteria:

For example, an application from a village hall for a grant towards the re-roofing of the building is likely to be more favourably considered than an application to pay for the hall to be regularly cleaned.

- 3. The area of benefit should, if possible, be shown to be in **Lancashire** and **South Cumbria**, particularly the area north of the River Ribble, eastwards towards the Blackburn area and into South Lakes.
- 4. It is helpful if the applicant is itself a charity registered with the Charity Commission. You will be asked to quote your registered charity number.

Penrith Lottery grant fund capital expenditure for not-for-profit organisations and charities and also financially support events within a five-mile radius of Penrith between £100 - £2,500. Applications are considered year-round on a monthly basis.

I. Awards will be given to voluntary/non-profit making organisations or to support community initiatives that benefit the town and the residents of Penrith.

Normally grants will only be given to organisations within a 5-mile radius of Penrith although in exceptional cases this boundary will be extended if the organisation can prove significant benefit to the residents of Penrith.

2. Grants will only be given for capital funding and events which directly benefit the community. i.e., not for general maintenance or running costs.

They cannot fund events if the intention is to pass on any surplus income to other organisations e.g., concerts which seek to benefit local charities.

- 3. Grants can start from as little as £100 but are usually capped £2500.
- 4. Monetary award applications will not be considered from party political organisations.
- 5. Monetary award applications will not generally be considered from any organisation where funding would normally have been derived from local or national government.

However, funding will be considered under exceptional circumstances where grant funding can help access larger sums under the concept of matched funding.

- 6. Funding will only be given to organisations where access is unrestricted. i.e. the benefits are available to all parts of the community.
- 7. All applications will be considered by the Penrith Lottery Committee and any decisions made will be final and not subject to appeal.
- 8. Evidence will be required to show that organisations have appropriate safeguarding policies in place when activities include children and other vulnerable persons.
- 9. Grant payments are subject to recipients supporting Penrith Lottery in a variety of ways and grant applicants are asked to refer to their Grant Acknowledgement Guidelines which contains an extensive list of ways their funding can be recognised.

In this way they can spread the word and encourage new members to join as well as receive more grant applications.

Thomas Wall Trust — Grants For Registered Charifies

Grants are available for UK registered charities for specific projects or core activities that equip disadvantaged people aged 18 and over with the necessary communication skills for employment.

Thomas Wall II created his Trust in 1920 for the "encouragement and assistance of educational work and social service". Today, the Trust continues to assist in these areas by providing grants to individuals and organisations. The Trust views communication skills as critical capabilities for people who want to improve their employment prospects, self-confidence, resilience, and life chances. The funding is for registered charities that are working to develop communication skills for people from disadvantaged groups who want to improve their employment prospects. Grants of up to £5,000 are available. The Trust will support annual repeat funding for up to three years – subject to satisfactory annual reviews of progress and impact.

Who Can Apply?

To be eligible, applicants must:

- Be a UK charity that has been registered with the Charity Commission for at least three years.
- Have an annual turnover of between £10,000 and £500,000.

Eligible Expenditure

The funding will support a project or running costs for a charity that equips disadvantaged people (aged 18 and over) with the communication skills ready for employment.

Priority will be given to:

- Match funded projects.
- Charities that can provide compelling evidence of impact.
- Charities working with collaborative networks.
- Self-sustainable projects, with a view to becoming less reliant on grants in the future.

Proposals are particularly welcome which target people experiencing multiple deprivation or other groups demonstrably facing major hurdles to employment, such as women, people with physical, mental, or learning disabilities, refugees and asylum seekers.

How to Apply

Applications are currently being accepted for the November 2022 meeting.

There is a two-stage application process.

- Stage one is to complete an online Expression of Interest form (available on the Trust's website) which requires some basic contact details and a description of what the funding is required for.
- Stage two is by invitation only and involves completing a more in-depth application form and to submit a Project Plan, budget, latest set of financial accounts and any relevant policies.

Successful applicants will be notified in writing along with the terms and conditions of the grant and asked for their payment details. Unsuccessful applicants will be notified by email unless the Trust receives an unusually high volume of applications.

Grants are available for small, locally based voluntary and community groups to support projects which benefit local communities around Co-op food stores and funeral homes across the UK or the Isle of Man.

The Co-op Local Community Fund supports projects across the UK that Co-op members care about. Every time members buy selected Co-op branded products and services, 2p for every pound spent goes to the member and the same amount is also given to support community organisations and local causes. The funding aims to help communities to come together, co-operate and have a positive impact on community wellbeing – physically and virtually. Grants are determined by Co-op community members who vote on the project they wish to support in their local community.

The more members that select a project and shop with Co-op, the more funding the project will receive. Who Can Apply?

Applications will be accepted from:

- UK registered charities.
- Scout, Guide or Woodcraft folk groups.
- Registered community amateur sports clubs (CASCs).
- Churches or chapels that are 'excepted' charities.
- Co-operative societies.
- Credit unions.
- Community benefit societies.
- Community interest companies.
- Any other organisation that can prove they are not run for profit.

To be eligible, groups or activities must:

- Make good things happen in their area.
- Be not-for-profit (unless they are helping people stay connected during coronavirus/Covid-19).
- Be locally run.
- Follow government guidelines on social distancing.

Priority will be given to organisations with an income of less than £1 million a year.

Eligible Expenditure

Funding is available for projects which benefit local communities centred around Co-op food stores and funeral homes.

The funding is for projects that:

- Enable people to access food and co-operate together to feed everyone.
- Help improve people's mental wellbeing.
- Offer young people opportunities to develop new skills and make a difference in their community.
- Help people protect local biodiversity or tackle climate change by reducing carbon emissions.

The money can be used to pay staff salaries or the project's running costs. For example, payment to a professional to give local children mental health awareness training.

Projects must:

- Take place in the UK or Isle of Man
- Not have religious or political aims (although religious groups can apply)
- Meet the Co-op's values
- Take place or will still be running after November 2023.
- Benefit their local community.

Co-operatives values are: self-help, self-responsibility, democracy, equality, equity and solidarity. (In the tradition of their founders, Co-operative members believe in the ethical values of honesty, openness, social responsibility and caring for others.)

How to Apply

The terms and conditions as well as the online application form are available on the Co-op's website when the scheme is open.

Once the deadline has passed and all the applications are reviewed, Co-op will select up to three projects to support in each community over the next giving period (usually 12 months, but it can vary). The projects will be displayed in store and online so Co-op members can choose which project they want to support in their community. Funding will be granted in November 2023.

Arts council England Project Grants

Grants are available to grassroots music venues and promoters in England to present live music programming, and for activities that put them in a better position to deliver their work in the long term.

The National Lottery Project Grants programme is Arts Council England's open-access programme for arts, museums and libraries projects. Supporting Grassroots Live Music is part of Project Grants, with its own budget set aside for supporting organisations and individuals whose work focuses on the hosting and promotion of live music events in venues. The purpose of Supporting Grassroots Live Music is to support activities that help grassroots music venues and promoters to deliver and develop their work, getting live music to more people across England. A total fund of £1.5 million will be available until 31 March 2023. Grants of between £1,000 and £40,000 are available, for projects lasting up to a maximum of three years.

Match Funding Restrictions: Applicants must provide at least 10% of total cost of their project using income from other sources. This can be cash support, or in kind, and could be the applicant's own contribution (for example, ticket sales), and/or support from any partners in the project.

Who Can Apply?

Applications will be accepted from organisations whose main function is to host and/or promote live music events in venues. Usually, this will be venues and promoters (or groups of venues and/or promoters).

The programme particularly seeks to support those venues and promoters who work in the grassroots part of the sector (i.e. those working with new, developing talent in small to mid-size venues). The programme supports projects that bring the full spectrum of contemporary popular music genres to live audiences, which includes, but is not limited to:

- Electronic (including house, electronica, drum & bass, dubstep, experimental etc).
- Hip-hop, grime etc.
- Indie and alternative.
- Metal and punk.
- Pop.
- Rock (including blues, modern, post-rock etc).

Applications must meet the four Project Grants criteria, as detailed in the application guidance document:

- Quality.
- Public engagement.
- Management.
- Finance.

Eligible Expenditure

Funding will support projects that might involve presenting live music programming, but they might also include activities that put live music venues and promoters in a better position to deliver their work in the long term. Examples of eligible projects include:

Artistic programming and audience development

This could include a season of performances or shows across one or more venues, or a particular project to develop a more diverse programme and audience, for example to allow the venue to take risks on programming new genres of music or new ways of presenting live music.

Developing a venue's resilience and sustainability

This could include trialling alternative uses of venues during non-showtimes, such as offering music-related activities to children and young people, afternoon performances, developing on- or off-stage talent, renting space out for rehearsals or training activities, paying for support with business planning, exploring new initiatives with partners, or mentoring from other venue or promoter colleagues.

Equipment purchases and small capital (building) works

Any plans for asset purchases must be part of a project that clearly demonstrates development of artistic activity and benefit to the wider public. Equipment purchases could include production equipment (sound or lighting) that will clearly make a positive impact on the artistic activity and audience engagement. Other purchases or building work could include alterations to venues to make them more accessible to all members of the public.

How to Apply

Groups should first read the How to Apply documents and the supplementary guidance regarding the priorities and criteria on the Arts Council website. Applications are made using Arts Council England's Grantium system.

- Applications for £1,000 and £30,000 are expected to receive a decision within eight weeks.
- Applications for £30,000 to £40,000 are expected to receive a decision within twelve weeks.

Grants are available to community and heritage organisations in England for projects which improve understanding and awareness of overlooked historic places and celebrate working class histories.

Historic England is delivering the Everyday Grants: Celebrating Working Class Histories programme as part of its Diversity and Inclusion strategy, published in 2020, which outlines its commitment to helping the heritage sector become more inclusive.

Funding is intended to support diverse projects, heritage and stories which may have been previously overlooked, with a particular focus on the everyday lives of working people and communities.

Grants of up to £25,000 are available. Smaller grassroots projects of less than £10,000 will be given priority for funding.

Who Can Apply?

All organisations are eligible to apply including community interest groups (CICs), charities and local authorities. There is particular interest in funding organisations which represent:

- Black, Asian and Minority Ethnic (BAME) communities.
- LGBTQ+ communities.
- Disabled or neurodiverse people.
- Working class communities.
- Women.
- Young people.

Eligible Expenditure

Projects should engage with a wide range of heritage and enable people to creatively share overlooked or untold stories of their communities.

Subjects could include:

- Places where ordinary people work and live.
- Working class communities and areas.
- Work and workers.
- People from lower socio-economic backgrounds.
- Heritage related to places with low social mobility.
- Social housing.
- Industrial heritage.
- Community heritage.
- Rural stories.
- Coastal towns.

Activities should provide innovative volunteering opportunities for young people or people facing loneliness or isolation, as well as contribute positively to participants' wellbeing.

Barclays community football fund

Grants are available to community groups in the UK to a make playing football more accessible at the grassroots level, and in particular encourage girls and young people from lower socio-economic and under-represented groups, including culturally diverse communities, young people with disabilities, and young people from the LGBTQ+ community to take part.

The Barclays Community Football Fund, in partnership with Sported, is a three-year programme, running from January 2022 to December 2024. During this time, it will offer small grants and additional support resources to grassroots groups across the UK.

The aim of the fund is to make playing football more accessible at the grassroots level, and in particular focused on including and inspiring girls and young people from lower socio-economic and under-represented groups, including culturally diverse communities, young people with disabilities, and young people from the LGBTQ+ community. Through the Fund, 5,550 community groups across the UK will receive grants, along with support, to develop inclusive football activities within their club. As a result, more than 150,000 young people will benefit from this collaboration. The aim of the fund is to make playing football more accessible at the grassroots level, and in particular focused on including and inspiring girls and young people from lower socio-economic and under-represented groups, including culturally diverse communities, young people with disabilities, and young people from the LGBTQ+ community. Grants of £500 are available. The funding will ideally be spent within a six-month period.

Who Can Apply?

Applications are accepted from not-for-profit organisations including community groups, youth groups and traditional football clubs. Applicants need to be a member of Sported to apply. To be eligible, applicants must:

- Deliver football activities to young people (aged 8 years+) OR are wanting to start.
- Already include an offering for girls OR are wanting to start.
- Have the aspiration and capacity to grow their membership of young people from underrepresented groups. This includes girls, young people with disabilities, from culturally diverse communities and from the LGBTQ+ community.
- Be keen to access training to learn about how to engage with new under-represented audiences.
- Have a constitution or articles of association.
- Have a bank account in the name of their organisation.
- Have a Safeguarding policy (updated within the last two years).
- Have a health and safety policy and any relevant risk assessments.
- Have up to date and relevant insurance.

Eligible Expenditure

The funding can be used for anything that will support project delivery. Typical examples of costs might include a contribution towards venue hire, coaching costs, volunteer expenses, equipment, kit, marketing and communications, training and qualifications, insurances and affiliation.

The funding should support engaging under-represented young people, particularly girls, and get them involved in football activities.

School Grants Scheme

Grants of up to £600 for projects, events and activities that promote a greater interest in physics and engineering in young people. The Scheme is run jointly by the Institute of Physics, the Institution of Engineering and Technology and the Science and Technology Facilities Council. We particularly encourage applications for projects that look at:

- particle physics
- astronomy
- space and nuclear physics
- energy
- transport
- information and communications
- design and promotion
- built environment

Grants can be used to cover the following costs associated with your project:

- materials and resources
- transport
- marketing and publicity
- other purposes deemed appropriate by the judges
- supply cover (in certain circumstances)

How much you can apply for

- You can apply for up to £600. We will not normally fund projects if our contribution is a small proportion of your project costs.
- If you are applying for a grant for a bought-in activity or show, your application will be stronger if you integrate those activities with a wider project.

Eligibility criteria

- You must submit your application yourself and not via a third-party provider.
- Your application must be unique and applicable to your school, college or home school group. We will not accept cloned or copied applications.
- Your application must be for costs associated with a new project. We will not fund costs for sustaining an existing project or a repeat application.
- Your project must directly involve pupils. We will not fund activities such as teacher CPD.
- Your project must add value over and above basic curriculum requirements. We will not fund
 equipment or materials needed for lessons to deliver the curriculum.
- If you have applied for and received a grant within the last three years, you will need to complete and return an evaluation form (PDF, 615KB) alongside your application.

How to apply

Applications for the School Grants Scheme are made via the IOP awards platform. Allow up to five weeks from the closing date for a decision.

Deadlines for applications

I February for projects taking place in the following summer term. I June for projects taking place in the following autumn term. I November for projects taking place in the following spring term.
