- 1) The meeting was called to order at 10:03 A.M.
- 2) Meeting Safety Briefing was given by Chairman, Donn Thane.
- 3) Consent for current Agenda and previous meeting minutes (Single Motion Needed): Approval of Agenda, Order of Business, and Minutes from 3/28/2019 Board Meeting was motioned by Williams and seconded by Trygg. Passed unanimously.
- 4) Public Comment: none made
- 5) Agency/Partner Reports:

Dr. Wilkin of UCCE: 20/20 Vision Summit was a great success and the burn workshop enrollment is full, with a waitlist for 2 additional full classes.

Julie Martin of the BLM: Pile burning will commence in the Shields Camp area this week continuing as long as necessary. Requested an update on the Ponderosa West project and assignment of duties. Jeff Pettitt of NevCo OES: Reminders for upcoming events with Green waste drops, Children's Carnival, Truckee Townhall and Builders Fair.

Elisa of Cal OES: She is happy to be back from Paradise and reported there have been leadership changes at her organization.

Jim Mathias of CalFire: Logging operations are active again within the county, burn piles are getting away from folks and caution is needed, burn permits will very soon be required and available on CalFire website, NEU is staffing more engines each week. NEU was awarded 2 priority projects this year by the governor, most other units only got 1. Reminder May 19 is WUI drill. Proposed new shaded fuel break in Woodpecker Ravine. Announced FSCNC will be awarded an agency partner award from NEU on May 2 at the ceremony in Auburn.

- 6) Report from the Executive Committee: Update n FEMA grants- might not be dead after all. We hired 1 additional part time chipping supervisor. Audits are underway, the 10 FWC's selected and paid for by NevCo are being added, current grant summary, Fire Season Guide 19/20 is almost completed thanks to Marty, CWPD and Carnival and green waste reminders, subsequent flyers shared. Chipping workload discussed; office space is too small- discussed needs for more room. Announced FSCNC participation in the CAFSC Legislative Day, and upcoming meeting with a rep from Congressman LaMalfa's office. Discussed issues within the DSAV program and potential misuse.
- 7) Report of the Chairman: Book recommendation and encouragement for directors to get involved and be present at upcoming events.
- 8) Report from the Finance Committee: Reviewed financial reports and statements. Discussed potential for income from the Ponderosa West Project.
- 9) Report from Executive Director: The ED reported on operations and upcoming grant opportunities. The Ponderosa West Project is estimated to start in June. Green Waste Disposal is approaching, as is the **Children's** Safety and Wildfire Safety Carnival.
- 10) Report from the Fundraising Committee:

  The Red Zone Event dates were announced as September 27 and 28, 2019.
- 11) Report from Projects Committee: DSAV refresher for original advisor group was discussed as well as hopes for a mentorship of sorts pairing experienced and new advisors together. Fire Season Guide update from Marty Main. WUI drill updates from LOP event.
- 12) Report from the Nominating Committee:
  Searching for a replacement Secretary for the Board is necessary.
- 13) Director Comments: Sue Hoek-suggested providing handouts for our free programs at Food Bank distributions to reach more low income folks; also, there will be no fires allowed in The Yuba River Canyon this summer. Wand Mertens: happy to announce Farmers has paid for our booth at the Fair and they are bringing their disaster response bus. Jamie Jones- Director orientation process is needed for new directors.

## Executive/Finance Committee Meeting Minutes 10893 Alta St, Grass Valley, CA 95945 Thursday, May 9, 2019

The meeting was called to order at 9:32 A.M.

No public comment.

**Review of April's DSAV class.** Approximately 65 trainees were in attendance. It was the largest class FSC has hosted. Recommended in the future to return to a smaller class size as the large number in attendance made logistics a challenge.

DSAV procedures were reviewed as per the FSC operating manual. The committee discussed the purpose of the program and confirmed that we should continue as per current operating policy. Specifically, that DSAV's are to be requested through the FSC office and to be assigned via the office as per the process outlined. FSC's DSAV program is widely popular as it is meant to support the organizations educational goals. Additionally, the program's success is in large part due to the voluntary participation and the fact that it is an advisory only offering and has zero enforcement or outside agency reporting.

Concerns about outside organizations and neighborhoods using the FSC DSAV program, outside of the scope of work outlined in FSC operations was discussed. Moving forward, the FSC DSAV program will continue to operate as intended. As it is a part of the FSC's mission to support the DSAV program, outside program support shall be offered to communities and neighborhoods to run their own DSAV programs, by way of offering assistance with advisor training only. Any outside programs offered that are similar in nature to the FSC DSAV program, but is not the FSC's program, shall not use FSC resources, materials, logos or branding. As content and authenticity cannot be monitored effectively in outside programs, FSC must be consciences of its own program's authenticity and purpose, which is modeled in an advisory capacity only, after CAL FIRE's Inspection program and form LE 100. The committee recommends that FSC publish an educational editorial piece via the local media. The piece should include and introduction to FSC and its mission, along with information about the organization's programs and purpose. Additionally, more information should be provided to the public about each organization or community group affiliated with FSC (i.e. Coalition of Firewise Communities and Firewise Communities), educating the community on each organization's roles and responsibilities. The Executive Committee has been tasked with meeting with any potential outside programs to clarify organizational goals.

An increase in very large requests of the office staff was discussed. FSC often receives very large requests, outside of FSC's available resources and funding. Rick Nolle made a motion to recommend to the Board of Directors, that the Executive Director shall be given imperial guidance in determination of what are deemed as reasonable requests of FSC resources. Bill Drown seconds, all in favor.

A press release will be sent to local media to announce the recruitment of additional Directors, specifically a Secretary.

Donn Thane will contact the new Directors to proceed with a board orientation. Pete Williams will put a process to paper for operating manual and the benefit of future Directors to use. The process will be presented to the Board of Directors for approval at the May 23<sup>rd</sup>, 2019 meeting.

An estimated scope of work was presented for the Ponderosa West Project. The County of Nevada is in the process of completing their contract with CAL FIRE. Stay tuned for more detailed upon finalization of contracts.

The Executive Director discussed the need for additional work trucks to be used on the Ponderosa west Project. The committee recommends the purchase of the appropriate trucks to be purchased to fill the need for the project. The ED vehicle has approx. 180,000 miles on it and is need of repairs. The board recommends the purchase of a new Executive Director vehicle immediately, as the repairs, age and mileage of the existing car are likely no longer cost effective. Motion made to recommend the purchase of vehicles by Rick Nolle, Dave Walker seconds, all in favor.

The office will be looking for a volunteer to help assist on phones. An Office Admin will be hired when additional grant funding or projects becomes available. Resumes are welcomed.

The Executive Director and Chairman represented the FSC at the Cal Fire All Hands Meeting. The FSC was awarded a Partnership Award by Cal Fire NEU.

The Green Waste Disposal Event was a tremendous success. All 6 locations were full by 1PM Saturday. Arrangements were made to have Waste Management provide a continuous rotation of containers to meet the need. Its estimated nearly 90 tons was collected the first weekend. The County of Nevada, Waste Management and Fire Safe Council are working closely to meet the needs of the coming weekends.

The 2019-20 Fire Season Guide was sent out in Saturday May 4ths paper. It was also available at the **Children's Health and Wildfire Safety** Carnival.

The meeting was adjourned at 11:43 A.M.

# California Fire Safe Council Legislative Walk Day May 7th 2019

#### **Talking Points**

**Overall Message:** The CFSC is promoting Wildfire Preparedness Week 2019 by bringing attention to the many local Fire Safe Councils (FSC's) and similar community groups that advocate for wildfire safety and resiliency. We are meeting to discuss what works well or doesn't in our local area and to ask for your support for our budget request for \$200k per county to help us pay for the admin expenses that grants don't cover.

Statewide, there are many local volunteer-based community groups that provide their neighbors with the information, tools, grants, and projects necessary to promote community wildfire resiliency.
These efforts include defensible space and home hardening information, community wildfire protection planning, chipper programs, community fuelbreak construction and maintenance, and insurance education.
<ul> <li>What FSC's do that is not easily accomplished by fire agency people</li> <li>Community outreach and connection at a neighbor-to-neighbor level</li> <li>More flexible conversations about choices, concerns, and support</li> <li>Knowledge of local communities needs and values</li> </ul>
Almost all grants include very limited funding for the administrative and day-to-day operational costs of organizing volunteers, developing project bids, attending meetings, and doing the small tasks necessary to run a volunteer-based program.
The CA Fire Safe Council, in partnership with local fire safe groups, and the California Association of Resource Conservation Districts, is asking for funding to provide each county with \$200K per year to cover these basic and critical needs. This can be done by providing funds to the CFSC for direct distribution to each countywide FSC. Best is a 3-year block grant.

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- The California Fire Safe Council originated over 25 years ago and the concept has spread around the state. Over 200 local fire safe groups including Fire Safe Councils, Firewise communities, Fire Adapted Communities, and Resource Conservation Districts work together to deliver the same wildfire preparedness message.
- ☐ Many local fire safe groups have a countywide governance structure to help coordinate among many neighborhood organizations.
- ☐ Grants are the main way these groups are funded to do their community work. Greenhouse Gas Reduction (SB 910) funds help but are restricted to defined carbon-benefit programs. They don't help with home hardening, our administrative costs, or planning.
- ☐ This means that while a group may receive a large grant for a fuelbreak, they struggle with staff workload, keeping the lights on, travel costs, training and sharing knowledge and the ability to have any discretionary funds. Here are some examples:
  - Need funding consistency for coordination and general 'get stuff done' money When grants are inconsistently awarded one year to the next, it is difficult to build programs.
  - Grants don't fund coordinators.
  - When grants don't arrive, there is no way to cover the people we have retained to work. Employee retention is poor.

Lit candles may not be carried on state property. F. Chalk shall not be applied to drives, walks, or lawns. G. Fire is not permitted on state property. H. Ice used to cool food and beverages shall not be dumped on walks, drives, planting areas, or lawns. This policy includes ice cream and beverages. I. Stanchions, stakes, tie down pegs, and all such devices shall not be placed in lawns, planting areas, walks, or drives on state property. Tents shall be secured with sandbags or concrete blocks, no water barrels are allowed to secure tents. It is the responsibility of the Permitee to ensure tent vendors comply with all applicable rules. J. Vehicles are not permitted on state property. Delivery or Display vehicles, as designated, may be permitted with prior written permission from the Department. Upon approval, all such vehicles are required to have drip pans under the engines and transmissions and must leave the property as soon as the delivery is complete. K. Firearms and other dangerous weapons are strictly prohibited on all state property except as provided by law under Penal Code Section 171b. L. Adhesive-backed handout materials are prohibited from being distributed. 23. ADDITIONAL INFORMATION: Information added in this section by the Department may contain special instructions or notes and must be followed by the Permitee. 
