The sad news of Will's untimely death reached me through Tuesday's Plain Dealer and today I have read more about it in Tuesday's New York Times. Previously I had noted where he had had a heart attack and the statement that the situation was very serious.

Well do I remember when Will arrived at Granville in the fall of 1900. We then had only three fraternities which, in the order of their founding at Denison, were Sigma Chi, Beta Theta Pi and Phi Gamma Delta. Our Chapter voted on him and Mark Winchester and I bid him. The other two did likewise. We were exceedingly happy when we won out.

I was one year ahead of Will in college and eleven months older. We became very intimate friends. In the last two years of my college life I roomed at the Sig House while Will was up on the hill. He stayed with me nearly every Friday night when we had fraternity meetings. Together we roamed the country side around Granville and on one occasion he and I went out direct north on the Mt. Vernon road to a brick house which, no doubt, you will remember and arranged with the farmer to pick peaches on shares. The farmer immediately gave us permission, came down, sat on a log and talked with us while we picked the peaches, then when we came to separate them, he came over and took charge. He gave us all the good peaches and kept the poor ones for himself.

In recent years I have not had any contact to speak of with Will. The terrific pace at which he lived and worked and my own fairly busy life made frequent contact impossible, but I shall ever remember the inspiration of having lived and worked with him in those college days.

Some of these days you and Dee may be passing through this way. If our plans carry out you will find our home at 157 Harper Street, New Concord, after October 1st and perhaps a little sooner. Our voting residence will remain here in Cambridge, but we have found there the best home that we have been able to locate in this vicinity and we like the college atmosphere, particularly the music. I am a trustee of Muskingum College as well as of Denison, but of course I am giving far more time and thought to my Alma Mater. However, the Muskingum
