Dear friends,

Many will have breathed a sigh of relief as the Covid 19 restrictions were eased to allow some sense of normality to return to our lives. In the last few weeks some of us have been able to see relatives and friends for the first time in about a year and a half. We have been able to hug and laugh and share experiences. Church services all over the country are returning to a semblance of what we were accustomed to. It's been good to be able to sing again, although masked singing and steam-up for wearers of glasses is quite a challenge.

We have had to get used to several new terms during this Covid time, and a common one is 'social distancing'. It's a strange term really if you try to analyse it, but maybe it is used to just mean 'keep your distance' or 'don't get too near'. Which brings me to the thought that Jesus, who is the sinless Son of God, had the greatest reason to keep His distance from sinful mankind. Yet He did just the opposite: "He came down to earth from heaven, who is God and Lord of all" as we sing in the Christmas Carol. And not only did He "come down" so that He could show us Himself in person, during His earthly ministry He got face to face with those He came to save. He touched and healed the lepers who, by the way, were commanded by the law to be socially distanced from others – yet Jesus touched them. He took the little children in His arms and blessed them, and He had meals in many different settings which, in that culture, meant getting very physically close to people.

No, Jesus wasn't a social distancer. He came into our humanness, but before His earthly ministry ended on the cross, He had covered a lot of ground up and down the length and breadth of Israel, Judah, and Samaria, teaching, healing, feeding and loving people to death. "Hallelujah! What a Saviour!"

As I close this letter, I can't help but think of the people of Afghanistan. That nation is now under the control of a regime whose track record on human rights is, to put it mildly, not good. The Christian community there asks for prayer as they are already being targeted. Please pray for all the people of Afghanistan.

We have so much to be thankful for in this country. Keep safe and well, and may God bless you all.

Diocesan News

Fresh Starts, Farewells, Back to Normal?

October looks like an interesting month for our diocese. Sarah Brown to be installed as Dean of Hereford, Alison Myers as Warden of Launde Abbey, the first face-to-face meeting of rural deans and senior staff for two years, confirmation services starting up again, Gordon Steele's farewell service – and much else.

So are we back to normal? I don't think we'll ever go back to life as it was before covid, nor should we. Whatever you think of the lockdowns, the mask-wearing, the school closures, the selfisolation and the "pinging", the arguments over preparedness and then over vaccination; whether you think the whole exercise



was a massive over-reaction, or that this summer was far too early to lift most restrictions; the pandemic has had a massive and permanent effect on our national life, and we cannot ignore that.

We haven't seen the last of mask-wearing. Our link diocese of Seoul in South Korea demonstrates that. The far east saw a severe outbreak of SARS twenty years ago, and mask-wearing became the rule for a couple of years. When I last visited, 15 years after masks ceased to be compulsory, significant numbers of people were still wearing them in crowded places. In some cases that was because of pollution, but the reality is that mask-wearing in public has become a fairly common occurrence in the east. On the other hand, in the west, the covid pandemic seems to have exaggerated culture gaps and reduced politeness and tolerance. People can get so very heated over the pro- and anti-vaxxing argument, even more so than over Brexit not so long ago.

We haven't seen the last of zoom and other online meetings. At the very least, I find myself doing one-to-one zoom chats rather than phone calls, and rather than driving an hour each way for a one-hour meeting. On the other hand, I now have to go to London for House of Lords debates, and can no longer participate via zoom (which I did for the emergency Afghanistan debate in mid-August).

As church, we are returning carefully, conscious of the possibility of a fourth wave this autumn and winter. We are going back, but to a new normal. With best wishes

Covid has wreaked havoc in many people's plans, not least wedding plans. I am pleased to say that the banns for Kimberley Wilson and Daniel Thompson were read in early September and the much-postponed wedding will finally go ahead on Saturday 23rd October.

Another happy event – as yet unscheduled – will be the presentation of a bronze award to the church by the *Bedfordshire, Cambridgeshire and Northamptonshire Wildlife Trust* in recognition of our work, led by Sandra Naylor, to encourage nature to flourish in the churchyard. Many congratulations to Sandra and Mark and our grateful thanks to the mowers and strimmers, Jeremy Craxford, Andy Forbes and Brian Keech, who have kept the grounds looking so good. We hope soon to be working with the School to establish a bug-hotel and to plant more wild flowers.

Many will know that Brian Keech has been striding in aid of the *Northamptonshire Historic Churches Trust* since the turn of the century and this year he 'nabbed' 15 churches including our own; there volunteers were on hand to welcome 20 other riders and striders with a smile and refreshments. Many, many thanks to them for giving up their time and to Brian for organising the reception. In 2020 Brian raised £402 for the Trust and has had pledges so

Tree Warden

The other day we went down to Devon to visit family. As they live a few hundred yards from the river Otter I was keen to go "walkies" by the river side as I have read that beavers have been reintroduced to that river. I have also written to the Forestry Society magazine on the subject to which another correspondent disagreed. As a forester I have always regarded "Cricket Bat" willows as one of my favourite trees. A valuable fast-growing hardwood that likes to grow near running water (note the willows by the stream at the crossroads). The beaver dams filter the flowing water and help with flood prevention.

Sadly over several days one saw no beavers or otters and on a halfmile walk along the river bank no damage to trees growing on the riverside. But my youngest granddaughter said that one dam had been started but it disappeared! And she muttered something about farmers.

One notes that the hazardous dead horse chestnut is still standing by the church paddock.

Twywell News

Shortening days, with the sun not nearly so high in the sky now, along with increasingly cool nights, bring back into service our wood burners and heating systems; the soil, loamy and rich, far more widely visible through the post-harvest cultivations in the fields. Increasingly favoured are the comforts of the fireside sofa and rich food recipes. These are all familiar signs of the approaching autumn. For many, with luck, the store room and freezer will be burgeoning with the produce of a successful year in the vegetable and fruit gardens and so our thoughts, instinctively, turn to the main event of the season, the Harvest Festival, which traditionally gives thanks for the year's bounty provided. This is the feast which closes a season that began with the Lammas Festival at the beginning of August. Our own Harvest Festival will be held at 11.00am on 24th October. This is amongst the most popular of all the Church festivals and will follow a modified Morning Prayer format, led by John Stapleton. All are welcome. Anyone interested in adding to the church decoration of flowers or harvest produce please contact a member of the PCC (details are posted in the church porch) or email us on st.nicholas.twvwell@gmail.com.

Our Harvest Lunch, with its fine seasonal fayre and which is also held in the church, will follow the Harvest Festival service and is a lovely social event in its own right.

The Remembrance Service this year will be held on Sunday 14th November at 9.15am, led by Revd. Graham Bell. The opportunity to reflect on the sacrifices of others, selflessly made on our behalf so that we may enjoy our freedom and liberty, is welcomed annually. We will remember them.

Other notable dates for October and November, nationally recognised, are; 13th October – St. Edward the Confessor Day. Edward was born just over the county border at Islip, Oxon, Nicknamed 'Confessor' because of his piety, his generosity to the poor and character which endeared him to his people. One of the last Anglo-Saxon Kings, he is best known for having founded Westminster Abbey where he now lies, and also for being the patron saint of England (until Edward III supplanted him with St. George).

21st October – Trafalgar Day. On this day in 1805, the Royal Navy fleet of 24 vessels ended Napoleon's plans for invasion of Britain by decimating the combined strength of the French and Spanish Navies, capturing or sinking 19 of the 33 enemy vessels, including the largest warship afloat at that time, the 140 gun *Santisima Trinidad.* The British fleet Admiral, Lord Nelson, was fatally wounded close to the end of the battle whilst pacing the quarterdeck, by a sniper on board the French vessel *Redoubtable* which sank in the gale soon after the end of the battle.

31st October – Hallowe'en (abr. All Hallows' Evening). The tradition we now recognise has its origins in the ancient Celtic festival of Samhain, when people would light bonfires and wear costumes to ward off ghosts. (See '*Other News*' below for this year's Twywell hallowe'en event).

1st November – All Saints Day. For over 400 years Christians have, on this day, prayed to ask the saints in heaven for help for whatever troubles they may have. The origin is, again, Celtic and was once known as the Festival of the Dead.

2nd November – All Souls Day. This commemoration of the faithful departed and prayers for those in purgatory deliberately follows All Saints Day, and is a timely reminder for us all to lead good Christian lives.

5th November – Bonfire Night. Seventeenth Century parliamentary terrorism was averted on this day 416 years ago. Some would say it still occurs in the chamber above regularly.

29th November – Day of Intercession and thanksgiving for the missionary work of the Church. With our personal connection to Rev. Horace Waller, Dr. David Livingstone and Gen. Charles Gordon, who all were at the forefront of major Church missionary expeditions overseas in the mid-late 19th Century, this festival has great significance within our village history.

We say a fond farewell to Tomas and Sam, along with their children Halle, Ted and Albie, who have left Twywell to be closer to family.

We warmly welcome Stav, Georgina and Kaitlyn Broadhurst into the community. We hope their stay with us will be long and thoroughly enjoyable. Straight into the village social scene, they arrived just in time to be able to attend the 'Twywell Get Together' event (see below).

Finally, after two years of absence, we have held a fund-raising event for St. Nicholas Church!

On Saturday 4th September, almost 100 villagers and friends enjoyed the 'Twywell Get Together', a fantastic day of two parts; firstly cream teas in the afternoon and, later, an evening of acoustic folk music from the excellent *Five String Thing Ceilidh Band*, with a delicious M.A. Coales donated pulled pork buffet supper and a licensed bar. From within the delightful venue of the Manor House gardens (by kind invitation of Anne Louise and Patrick) the event was transformed by fairy lights, fire pits, flowers and a tented arena. The evening could not have been a more perfect way for the village community to once again enjoy their collective company. The generosity and support the PCC received through manpower, donations, contributions of every kind and ticket purchases were incredibly humbling. We were also privileged to use the event to showcase the marquees and entertainment equipment which was acquired by the Twywell Community Events committee through the National Lottery Communities Fund. Far too numerous to list individually, we thank you all for your commitment to this event and are very pleased to say that £1449 was raised for our severely depleted Church funds. It was a truly magical event, surely to be repeated in the future.

RECIPE

Hedgerow Jelly

Ingredients

750g / 1lb 10oz crab apples or sharp cooking apples 750g / 1lb 10oz mixed hedgerow fruits (e.g. blackberries, sloes, bullaces, damsons, rose hips, haws, elderberries), leaves and stalks removed 600g-700g / 1lb 5oz-1lb 9oz granulated sugar



Method

Rinse the crab apples in cold water, removing any stalks or leafy bits – there's no need to peel or core the apples, just chop them roughly. Place the crab apples and berries in a large saucepan with approximately 1 litre/1³/₄ pints water or just enough to cover the fruit. Bring to the boil, then simmer until all of the fruit is soft and pulpy, crushing it every so often with a potato masher or spoon to help break down the fibres. Remove from the heat.

Strain the cooked fruit though a jelly bag or muslin-lined sieve set over a large bowl – press lightly on the surface to push the juice, leaving the fruit fibres in the muslin. Leave to drip through for several hours or overnight. To speed things up, place a small saucer on the surface of the fruit with a weight on top.

Measure the juice (it will be approximately 1 litre/1¾ pints). For every litre of juice, weigh out 650g/1lb 7oz granulated sugar. Pour the juice into a clean saucepan and bring to a simmer. Add the sugar, a third at a time, and stir until dissolved. Increase the heat and bring to a rapid boil for 9–10 minutes or until the setting point is reached. Remove from the heat.

Leave to rest for a few minutes, then tip into a jug. If a skin has formed, carefully remove with a slotted spoon or jam skimmer. Fill the sterilised jars to the brim and seal immediately with the lids. Store in a cool, dark place for up to 1 year. Keep in the fridge once opened and use within 3-4 months. Makes approximately $6-7 \ge 200$ ml/7fl oz jars.
