
50 Years of Television in Australia

Great to read with Youtube by your side.




50 Years of Australian Television: An insider's view 1956-2006




Stars of Australian Stage and Screen

(Rigby, 1965)

Author Hal Porter

Hal Porter's 304 page book is essentially a collection of biographies but along the way, it records the history of our theatre and our film industry and shows how intertwined the two branches of performing arts are . From the first playhouse in Sydney in 1796 to the world's first motion picture play, 'The Early Christian Martyrs', made in 1899 by Joseph Perry for the Salvation Army, the movers and shakers have been documented in great detail. 41 black and white photos, illustrate a very readable account.





Author Eric Reade

A chronological discussion of Australian film following the silent era. It is a sequel to Eric Read's 'Australian Silent film'. Ken G. Hall introduces the book, which includes 100s of photographs and a list of feature films (and selected documentaries) from 1930 to 1970 each with production and cast credits and some screening details.




The Pictures That Moved: A Picture History of the Australian Cinema, 1896-1929

Authors Joan Long and Martin Long

Based on Joan Long's documentaries 'The Pictures that Moved' and 'The Passionate Industry'. The book includes the scripts to both films and over 250 stills from her movies. Very much a book of pictures with detailed captions.



The Australian Screen: A Pictorial History of Australian Film Making

(Lansdowne Press, 1975)

Author Eric Reade

Probably a 're-hash' of the content of Reade's earlier books, 'Australian silent Film' and 'The Talkies Era' collected in the one book. Many of the same photographs and an appendix listing Australian feature films in chronological order. A section on Documentaries, shorts and experimental films from 1960-75.






Footnotes to the Film

Other chapters on film criticism, why people go to the cinema, censorship and film societies!




The Australian Stage: A Documentary History



Theatre in Australia

Author John West

(Cassell, 1978)

Written by the ABC's John West, a voice many will have known over the years. It began life as a radio program in 1958 focussing on four theatres – the Royal in Brisbane, the Tivoli in Sydney, the Tivoli in Melbourne and His Majesty's in Perth – which John introduced (and researched). He went well and truly beyond the shows narrow brief and John's interest in all aspects of theatre continued for 20 years afterwards. A very personal history packed with illustrations.



Entertaining Australia: an illustrated history

Edited by Katherine Brisbane

(Currency Press, 1991)

Katherine Brisbane's 20 page introduction is an essay which outlines the role the entertainment industry has had in defining our national identity.

The book itself is 360 pages of film, radio, television, music and theatre written by over 80 different contributors. And yes, lots of fabulous sketches and photos.
