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## 1. From the Editor - Ian Davidson

#### 4. New Titles from the NTLC at the NFSA

The NTLC (Non-Theatrical Lending Collection) is part of the NFSA (National Film and Sound Archive) in Canberra. There are almost 1,000 DVD and BluRay titles available for loan to film societies at \$22 (including rights and delivery to you). See their catalogue at loans.nfsa.gov.au

Also don't forget that the NTLC may have some older titles which you will not be able to get elsewhere. Even where the original Australian distributor no longer holds current rights, the NTLC may have purchased the screening rights themselves.

The NTLC may be able to licence a viewing of your own copy of a DVD where they hold the screening rights to that title in their collection. This means that if a title held by the NTLC is already booked out when you want it, you can use your own copy after paying the NTLC the normal \$22 fee for the screening rights for that title.

## Customer and Membership Care in Voluntary Film Societies

As you well know, for local film societies - whether large or small - members are everything! Once a film club has been operating for several months, its existing members will now be its most important asset. As long as they are in sufficient numbers, they are usually the principal source of the society's revenue - & its ability to continue paying its bills.

Indeed, it's often said that the world of business is a "Country Ruled by Two Kings". And who are they? Customers & Cash! And that applies to local film societies too. Like all organisations, you have to pay your bills!

So once you have members, you want to keep them, don't you? Bearing in mind how hard it is to find new members, retaining existing ones is essential.

Your film society knows its current members. But you don't know who your future members will be, until they've joined your club. That's why keeping existing members happy and loyal is essential for your film society's financial survival.

So how do you keep your members loyal and long-lasting? Quite simple – it's by providing them with films they enjoy, in a venue they like, at a price they consider fair, and by giving them good customer service. How? By being served each time by committee people and helpers who they like, and who show they like them by always being welcoming to them.

In customer service terms, how should this be done? For example, by:

Getting to know your members personally, treating them as your local film club family, and encouraging them to feel you value them.

If possible treating members, and all volunteers and helpers, as personal friends, especially while your society is a small one. After all, you have similar interests (films and your film club), don't you?

Welcoming them back after lockdown, perhaps with one or more special celebratory 'return to normality' films.

Having a regular pre-film newsletter that is both informative about your next film(s), and whose wording should leave the readers very eager to know what's going to happen in the upcoming film - and the only way they'll find out is by actually coming to see it! Keeping them informed whenever your film club takes a new direction, however small - via regular pre-film circulars about the society and its current film program. And Only showing those films that you believe your members (and potential new members also) will really enjoy seeing. Naturally your film selection group should resist the temptation of choosing those films that they personally want to see (or even believe, e.g. perhaps for personal or ideological reasons, that your members ought to see), however tempting this may sometimes be.

Happy customers - i.e. your members - will spread the word to friends, family, and acquaintances, and often with genuine enthusiasm. This makes good customer service a very cost and energy-effective way of promoting your film society.

At its core, quality customer service in film societies is about making sure your members feel they are valued, treated fairly, and appreciated by your organization. Frankly if you offer exceptional service, why would your customers and members ever bother to go elsewhere?

## 7. Running an AGM under COVID-19 restraints?

Judging from comments from several film societies it would appear most are still not back to conducting screenings, and may not be able to do so until later this year or even next year.

What does this mean if you are due to hold an AGM in this period? The normal requirement for incorporated organisations is that they hold the AGM within five months of the end of their financial year, and submit an annual report, including financials, to the ACNC as soon as possible thereafter.

However, any society not screening during this time will find it difficult to hold an AGM. I have therefore, on behalf of all incorporated film societies, approached the CAV (Consumer Affairs Victoria) for their advice. They have recognised the difficulty caused by COVID-19, and where a society cannot hold their AGM within the normal period, either face-to-face or by electronic means, they can request an extension of time. This option is always open to organisations, but because of COVID-19, the CAV will waive the normal charge for deferring it for up to three months. (Check your own state Consumer Affairs for their advice, if not in Victoria)

Verbal advice from CAV is that if the organisation wishes to waive the AGM altogether for the full year of suspended screenings, they should approach the CAV for permission to do so, and would be evaluated case-by-case.

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## Incorporated associations (clubs)

If your club or association is scheduled to hold a meeting, you must follow the restrictions on gatherings in place.

#### Holding a meeting

Under the Deputy Chief Health Officer's directions, up to 10 people can hold a public gathering such as a meeting in a public place. Up to five people can hold a private gathering, such as a meeting held at an association member's home. This limit does not include any people who ordinarily reside at the premises.

Where a meeting is held in a facility such as a community or a physical recreation facility, a range of other restrictions and requirements will also apply.

People at gatherings should keep 1.5 metres between themselves and others and practise good hygiene, with regular hand washing and hand sanitising. If you feel unwell, even if you have tested negative for coronavirus (COVID-19), you should stay at home. For more information, see Social gatherings - Department of Health and Human Services.

If you're unable to satisfy these requirements and need to hold a meeting, you can:-

- use a teleconference, videoconference or other means of electronic communication. The *Associations Incorporation Reform Act 2012* (the Act) permits members to take part in general meetings by using technology that allows members to clearly and simultaneously communicate with each other, regardless of the incorporated association's rules about this. The Act also permits meetings of the committee of an incorporated association to be conducted by use of technology that allows members to clearly and simultaneously communicate with each other.
- use proxy voting. You must use a standard form to proxy vote if the rules of the incorporated association require you to do so. Members must be given a copy of the form with the notice of the AGM/Special General Meeting. A person acting as a proxy must act honestly and in good faith and exercise due care and diligence
- apply for an extension of time to hold the AGM. The Registrar is currently granting three-month extensions and waiving the usual fee.
