# Introduction

Sheffield BID is working closely with Sheffield City Council and other partners on the phased plan to support businesses, employees and customers as COVID-19 lockdown restrictions are lifted.

Initial plans have been developed to welcome people back to the city centre as government guidance develops.

It is important that we all work together to create a safe, secure and sustainable reopening.



- FIVE STEPS TO SAFER WORKING TOGETHER

#### **Important** information

#### What is the risk?

During the COVID-19 lockdown, many businesses have had to close to protect public health and reduce the spread of the virus. However as businesses start to consider re-opening, as restrictions are lifted, it is For all organisations important to ensure that public health continues to be protected. A potential health risk relates to Legionella in water systems that have not been used during the lock down period.

> Buildings should have in place a risk assessment and a Water Safety Plan, but dormant water systems will result in bacterial growth, especially in warmer weather. Legionella, which is naturally present in water systems, causes Legionnaires' disease which is fatal in 10% of cases. This can be avoided by following appropriate advice.

#### Who needs to take action?

- dental practices
- hair dressers
- hotels
- sports clubs office buildings (especially those with shower facilities)
- any organisation that has a water supply and is currently shut down

#### What action will reduce the risk?

Regular flushing of the premises water system throughout the shut down period is required. However, all aspects of the water management system need to be reviewed before re-opening the business, and necessary action will be dependent on the complexities of the system. This may be done by a combination of workers employed by the organisation if they have the necessary skills and knowledge. However, if a water system requires disinfection then a water consultant will be needed.

# **Recommendations for local businesses**

TRADING HOURS	Retailers should discuss with neighbouring stores the potential for staggering opening hours to ease queuing, promote social distancing and enable phased travel for employees and customers. Sales and promotions should be avoided initially and specific hours set for returns and refunds.
QUEUING AND SOCIAL DISTANCING	Businesses should discuss their queuing procedures with their neighbouring businesses, in order to work together to successfully promote social distancing. It is the responsibility of individual businesses to manage the queues outside their own premises. HEALTH & SAFETY MEASURES	You must ensure that your venue has sufficient social distancing measures in place. Read the British Retail Consortium's <u>guidance</u> for stores and warehouses as well as the UK Government's COVID-19 <u>working safely</u> guidelines.
STAFF TRAINING AND WELLBEING	Your staff should be inducted on their first shift back to be made aware of any new rules, regulations and guidance that your business puts in place. These may include: personal hygiene guidance and what personal protective equipment (PPE) will be provided for staff, new procedures on cleaning of surfaces, product and payment methods, plus recommendations for staff wellbeing during working hours and break times.
TRANSPORT	As a partnership, SYPTE, Sheffield City Council, Sheffield BID and other agencies encourage employers to stagger work times to help social distancing and avoid congested services on the transport network. # **Ensuring consistency, safety and sustainability across the city centre**


RISK ASSESSMENT	You will need to review your Workplace Risk Assessment (RA) so that you are COVID-19 secure. The Government's <u>guidance notes</u> show you how to do this. All shops <u>MUST</u> have a risk assessment.
PUBLIC REALM	With social distancing, the city will look different. On key routes, social distancing pavement graphics will be installed and some pavements will be widened to accommodate social distancing. There will be an element of road closures in the initial days of the reopening phase and we will ensure affected businesses are kept updated around the details of this.
SECURITY AND ACCESS	Businesses will be responsible for managing customer access/egress and queuing into their premises. If you have any concerns relating to this or in relation to deliveries please contact <a href="mailto:operations@sheffieldbid.com">operations@sheffieldbid.com</a> .
CLOSED PREMISES AND VACANT UNITS	Our night-time security patrol (which operates from midnight to 6am 7-days a week) and our Street Rangers team will also help to monitor closed premises and vacant units on their daily rounds.

# **Planned road closures**

To maintain social distancing, road space will be repurposed temporarily to ensure the safe movement of pedestrians at key points.

- Footpath widening has already been introduced in many areas across the city to make it as safe as possible for people to travel on foot.
- The next phase is the introduction of road closures and cycle lanes, designed to provide the infrastructure needed to encourage people to make significant changes to how they get around the city.
- Changes to Pinstone Street form a central part of this project, with footpaths between Cross Burgess Street and Furnival Gate being widened to support social distancing in this usually busy part of the city.

- A full closure for all traffic except pedestrians and cyclists will also be in place past the Peace Gardens.
- Bus routes in this area will be diverted.
- Vehicle access from Furnival Gate into Pinstone Street (northbound) will remain open so that the construction of Heart of the City regeneration sites, and deliveries, can continue.
- There has been a partial-pedestrianisation of Division Street, from Westfield Terrace to Rockingham Street.
- The city centre will also see the addition of 50 new cycle spaces, as temporary cycle lanes are introduced to further encourage people to go car-free.
