Sunday Services

As Unitarian Universalists we all hold personal beliefs that are grounded in one or more of the sources of our faith. Join us as we explore the six sources of our faith, so that we can learn more about the foundational beliefs of our congregation members.

July 2, 10:30 am, "Being Queer in the US". What does it mean to be a Queer/LGBTQIA+ individual in the United States right now? How has that evolved and changed over time? What does it mean to be an Ally and what are we called to do as Allies? We will explore these questions and more. We'll hear from several Queer individuals within our congregation to help us be more informed about what we can do, as individuals and as a congregation, to support our Queer members and the larger Queer community here in the greater Lynchburg area.

July 9, 10:30 am, Poetry by John Guzlowski. John did a reading at the congregation about 5 years ago. He read poems about his parents. They were both Catholic Poles, taken to Germany by the Nazis as slave laborers. The poems tell their story.

In John's words: "Yes, I'm a poet. I've also written mystery novels reviewed in the New York Times but poems are easier to read. Nobody will stick around until I finish reading a mystery novel to them."

July 16, 10:30 am, "The View from the Bridge: Why We Gather" Why do we as individuals participate in organized (or disorganized!) religion? Come yet again, as we explore how religion serves as a bridge in our lives.

Our Guest Speaker is Anna Talou, Ministerial Intern with the Blacksburg Unitarian Universalist Congregation.

This is also a Generosity Sunday.

July 23, 10:30 am, "Sources of Our Faith" Join us as we explore the first two sources of our faith: • Direct experience of that transcending mystery and wonder, affirmed in all cultures, which moves us to a renewal of the spirit and an openness to the forces which create and uphold life; • Words and deeds of prophetic people which challenge us to confront powers and structures of evil with justice, compassion, and the transforming power of love

July 30, 10:30 am, "Sources of Our Faith" Today we explore our two sources that connect us to organized religious traditions

- Wisdom from the world's religions which inspires us in our ethical and spiritual life:
- Jewish and Christian teachings which call us to respond to God's love by loving our neighbors as ourselves.

I have been encouraged to continue our conversation about the reality that Climate Change is inside us. As we dig into summer, it is a good time to look a little deeper into our changing perceptions and expectations of our surroundings. This month, as we travel, garden, explore or relax, spend some time remembering what July was like when we were younger. Do our current days seem different? Growing seasons seem to be shifting as our climate changes. One thing I remember is that my grandfather always said that the best watermelons were harvested around July 4. Today we don't think about only having watermelons available when they come from a farm down the road or from the next state. Now we can purchase any fruit every month of the year. Moving produce around the world contributes to global warming. Production of crops are shifting shift as climate change affects growing patterns.

Can we begin to live more sustainably by eating locally all year? Barbara Kingsolver took that challenge and wrote a wonderful book, "Animal, Vegetable, Mineral", about her family's year of raising and bartering for all the food they consumed on their farm in SW Virginia. Living in this wonderful area of the world means that even if we don't have a garden, we can support our neighbors by frequenting local farmers' markets. This is one small way we can counteract the effects of climate change.

I hope this month you will think back on how you lived during summer as a child and how you might make changes to live more simply. Shifting our focus to relationships and the natural world rather than consuming offers so many health benefits. Perhaps as we reconsider how we want to live, the effects of Climate Change that lives within us might be mitigated.

May we live simply and joyfully and peacefully this July. Terre
