I am grateful to Mary Williams, Bob MacCallum, and Mr. Hobbs for writing wonderful histories of our congregation. Seven charter members started First Unitarian Church in 1913. In May 1918 worship services were discontinued due to resignation of the minister, strained finances, and the Spanish flu. The Women's Alliance and the Sunday School continued meeting. In February 1924, The American Universalist Association sent Rev. Dr. George Kent to reenergize the congregation. By March 1926 the sanctuary we still use was dedicated. In 1978 the congregation purchased Unitarian House for RE class room space and in 2001 we dedicated the Fellowship Hall addition that provides an elevator, fellowship space and RE classrooms.

We demonstrated resiliency during our CoVid isolation of 2020 and 2021 by quickly finding ways to stay connected by Zoom and other electronic methods.

Our congregation and its members have worked for social and environmental justice throughout our history. A few of these include:

- * Founding member Elizabeth Lewis and her daughter marched with other suffragettes to picket the white house in 1917;
- * Church organist and Randolph College student Elizabeth Bentley was sentenced to 30 days in jail for sitting in at Pearson's drug store;
- * We started Emergency Fuel Assistance for the Elderly in 1974 and turned it over in 2002 to the Interfaith Outreach Association;
- * Became a Welcoming Congregation in 2009; and, Certified as a Green Sanctuary congregation in 2013

As we continue to work for justice and live love in the world, may we remember that together we are stronger.


Saunders Brothers Farm Market and Lovingston Cafe October 26 at 10:30 am

At its last meeting, JART decided to ask the board to approve the church's participation in this program, which is coordinated by the Virginia Interfaith Center for Public Policy (VICPP). Their work is non-partisan. It does not work with or endorse candidates or work with political parties.

Every Virginia state House and Senate seat is up for election this November. And this will be the first time these House and Senate candidates have run in the new districts following last year's redistricting. Some districts will have competitive races and some will not; regardless, all eligible voters should learn about the candidates' positions and public policy priorities, and make their voices heard by voting.

You'll be hearing more over the coming weeks about the election. We'll be gathering sample ballots for all the counties where our members and friends live, helping folks register to vote or change their address, apply for an absentee ballot, and check where they should go to vote absentee-in-person.

Let us know if you're also passionate about VOTING and would like to help us become a 100% VOTING CONGREGATION.

Supporting the democratic process is one of our core values and each member can anticipate hearing from us to ensure that we are living out our core values.

Dear friends,

I am delighted that it is October and the fullness of Autumn is upon us. I hope this note finds you and your family well as we embrace the beauty of this season. In our household, my wife, Kim, and I both have October birthdays, so it just makes the month even more special. The changing leaves, cozy sweaters, and the aroma of pumpkin-spiced (or, my personal favorite, apple cider-spiced!) everything are sure to bring warmth and joy to your days.

As we transition into October, I wanted to share what you can expect in Religious Education classes for this month. Just like the vibrant hues of fall leaves, our program is filled with enriching experiences for your children.

This month, our younger Religious Education classes will continue with the Soul Matters curriculum as we take a look at the theme of Heritage. To better understand this topic, we'll have stories, activities, movement, and craft so that we can experience the theme experientially.

Our older kids (5th-8th grade) will be continuing their look at gaming through an UU lens, as they work together at Building a Better World.

If you have a child in preschool-1st grade or 2nd-4th grade, here is what you can expect: Soul Matters is a handson, exploratory curriculum. We use multiple learning modalities including books, music, movement, arts and crafts, sensory experiences, and shared experiences to learn the values in this curriculum. The Value we will be exploring in October is Heritage. We will be studying and exploring:

October 1 - Staying Close to Our Roots

October 8 - Reclaiming Our Roots

October 15 - Being Rooted in Science and Reason

October 22 - Our LGBTQ+ Roots

October 29 - Multigenerational Service honoring Samhain

*Here is what to expect in a multigenerational service: children in preschool-4th grade will remain in the sanctuary throughout the service and will be invited to participate in many aspects. We do not have Religious Education classes for this age group on these Sundays, though the nursery will remain available for infants. Please do not worry about the wiggles and noises of your children, they are a delight to have in the service. They, you, everyone, is welcome and invited to bring their whole selves, the fullness of who they are, into this sacred space with us. As a reminder, our 5th-8th graders will not be participating in most multigenerational services this year, as they will be continuing to Build their Better World. I will note any exceptions in future letters, but for October, they will remain with their class and not in the sanctuary for Multigen day.

Finally, if you have a youth 9th grade+, let's chat about options for them and our infant nursery is available at all times.

There will be new programming for Adults this fall as well. A new Soul Matters cohort is starting for in-person gatherings. Soul Matters Small Groups meet once per month. If you are interested in joining the in-person cohort, reach out to DLE Courtney Sinha for more information. There is also likely to be openings in one or more of the online cohorts as well, if that format works better for you. Reach out and we can talk about it further! The final session of New to UU takes place on October 1, after the service. Lunch and child care are provided. You do not have to have attended previously in order to join this session. We will be diving directly into being part of UUCL in this class and we would love to tell you more about church life.

Creating Theology Together has been deferred to a November start date, but we look forward to seeing you on November 2nd as we dive into a new curriculum together. This study is 12 sessions long, but is divided into 3 very manageable parts. We will do the first 4 sessions in November and December. And then sometime after the start of the new year, we will do the second set of 4 sessions. Finally, we will end with the final 4 sessions later in the spring. Signing up for the first session is not a commitment to all 12, though we, of course, hope you will join us for the whole journey. However, it is important to note that the sessions build upon one another, therefore, you will not be able to enroll in the second session without participating in the first session. Join us on Thursday evenings this fall for dinner and study/discussion. Child care can be available with advanced registration. Please watch your email for registration information coming soon. (Please register even if you do not need child care to help with planning purposes.) If you have any questions about the class, see Rev. Terre or DLE Courtney.

Finally, an all-ages Growing UU Families will start in October. This is an opportunity to learn more about what UU in the home can look like - we will touch on UU in the media, rituals, family activities, and more. Children are welcome and invited to participate alongside their adults. We will share a meal and learn all about UUism together. Please watch your email for an inquiry regarding best timing and then for registration information.

Just like the changing seasons bring a sense of renewal, our Religious Education program aims to provide a nurtur-
