How do we say 'half past eight in the morning'? How do we say 'half past seven in the evening'?

Point to note

We don't use any word for 'at' with times o'clock.

Now let's practise

esta ...? 'are you ...?' (so called long form: for locations + actions / states)

Imagine you have just called somebody on their mobile number:

Are you in the pub? Esta i'n tavern?

Are you in the car? Esta i'n carr?

Are you at school? Esta i'n scol?

Are you in bed? Esta i'n gwely?

Are you in the garden? Esta i'n lowarth?

Now be the person receiving the call:

Yes, I'm in the pub. Eâ (Esof), yth esof [vy] i'n tavern.

No, I'm not in the car. **Nâ (Nag esof), nyns esof [vy] i'n carr.** etc

Now be the caller again, telling a friend:

He's at school. Yma ev i'n scol. Yma i'n scol. Yma va i'n scol.

She isn't in bed. Nyns usy [hy] i'n gwely.

They're in the garden. Ymowns y i'n lowarth.

They're not in the garden. Nyns usons y i'n lowarth.

etc

Now let's do it all again with actions / states:

Are you eating in the pub? Esta ow tebry i'n tavern?

Are you walking to the car?

Are you going to school?

Are you reading in bed?

Are you working in the garden?
