There are three main sources for flowers and bushes:

- 1. Purchased already made items
- 2. Kits to assemble
- 3. Own ideas made from materials on-hand/repurposed items

I will provide some examples for each of the above, with the biggest emphasis on do it yourself ideas.

There are lots of pictures. Many of these items I have had for several years. What is available currently at dollar stores, Michaels, Home Sense/Winners, IKEA, Hobby Wholesale, etc. is variable. My examples are just samples of what can be made from fake florals/leaves. The exact products that I am showing may not be available.

KITS TO ASSEMBLE (continued)

Check your favorite shopping sites for kits, check your stash for those unfinished plant/flower kits.

Here is a 1/12 scale clematis kit that I did for the club several years ago that may fit into your landscape.

[Where is your Staghorn Fern birthday gift? It may fit into your fantasy world}

(My on hand kits are more suitable for 'regular gardens' but you can always ask.)

DO IT YOURSELF MATERIALS AND IDEAS

Ferns. There are many fake ferns to be found,



The stems/fronds can be taken apart and be made into miniature ferns. Glue small lengths of wire to the bottom of smaller fronds if necessary to facilitate planting.



<u>Cactus and Succulents</u>. Fake plants can be cut down to form scale items.



Fake plants can be cut down/disassembled to form scale items.



In vases but can be planted in the ground.

<u>Miscellaneous Foliage.</u> There are many types of foliage to be found.

<u>Miscellaneous Foliage (continued).</u> These can be disassembled. Here are a couple of examples:





Moss. There is loose moss but also 'moss stones'.



I bought this large bag in anticipation of doing the 'Tufty Burrows" project. On the right is how I used moss on my 'Little Stump House'.





The moss and moss stones can be used to make bushes; can add leaves or add flowers





<u>Foliage Fluff and Clumps.</u> Hobby Wholesale and any train store will have a variety of green fluff and clump foliage, even in net form. This can be used to augment the foliage on plants and bushes, as well as trees. Look at the size of the 'granules' to see what may work for your project.





Here, I have used lumpier fluff to turn a piece of loose moss into a more substantial bush.



Paint styrofoam shapes green and then cover with green fluff for bushes and topiaries

<u>Foliage Ropes and Garlands.</u> There are many of these available to use to make bushes and plant leaves. Most I have obtained at dollar stores over the years.



Some ideas: Use for vines and climbing plants. The example right may turn into a seating unit, as the arbor turned out a little short!



FLORAL. There are many fake florals available to repurpose.



Not all are successful however! I bought these at a dollar store because they offered multiple colors. Unfortunately, they have done a lot of 'shedding'. They are likely headed for the bin. Buyer beware!



Some ideas – let's just call them 'Fantasy Flowers'!:







I bought these florals in 8 colors from a dollar store quite awhile ago. The tiny flowers can be used in clumps or singly.

I used these flowers on my 'Little Stump House'.



<u>Beet Seed Roses.</u> These may not get a passing grade under a microscope, but are fine from a distance.



I did a mockup as this may work well with Tina's arbor workshop in March.



<u>Colored Fluff.</u> Available at Hobby Wholesale and train stores.



Flowersoft – check scrapbook stores.







Punches and Punchies.

Digital Cutting Machines such as Cricut and Silhouette.

??Are there patterns for 3D printed flowers and plants??



Bird of Paradise Leaves



Anthurium Flowers

Pots. There are many sources of free pots available:



Caps from lip balm, toothpaste Game Pieces Hotel toiletry lids Beads

I just saved this great pair of vases from a window blind – they are the string pull weights!
