A special highlight this quarter was the return of our awareness-raising walk, which had not been held for the past four years due to COVID-19 and other restrictions. The walk was a tremendous success, drawing attention to our cause and bringing our community together in a powerful display of solidarity and support.

Our annual celebration of National Epilepsy Week took place from February 12-27, 2024. Through a collaborative effort involving the Ministry of Health, CareEpilepsy Ethiopia, WHO, and the Association of Ethiopian Neurologists, along with the support of sponsors, we were able to deliver a program that addressed critical aspects of epilepsy care and education. This event provided an invaluable opportunity to educate the public, healthcare professionals, and policymakers about epilepsy. We are thrilled to report that the ROW Foundation generously donated Keppra (levetiracetam) and lamotrigine, which are crucial in our ongoing efforts to provide essential medications to those in need. Additionally, we have strengthened our epilepsy-at-school education initiatives by placing advocates in schools and hosting joint teaching sessions for students and teachers. Our training programs for healthcare professionals, including a recent session in Adama, equipped nurses and health officers with the skills necessary to manage epilepsy effectively.

Expanding our outreach and partnerships continues to be a priority. Our network of partner organizations, including the International Bureau for Epilepsy (IBE), WHO, the Ministry of Health, and other stakeholders, is growing, strengthening our advocacy efforts and policy influence. This expansion is a testament to the collaborative spirit and dedication of our team, volunteers, and supporters. We are also excited to welcome two new staff members to our team, Dr. Hana Mulugeta and Dr. Bezawit Ketma, whose expertise will undoubtedly enhance our capacity to deliver high-quality care and support.

NEUROLOGISTS AND NURSES AT THE FOREFRONT: PROVIDING EXPERT CARE TO PATIENTS




In the First quarter of 2024, we are excited to share our significant accomplishments:

- Medication Emergency Financial Support: We provided anti-epileptic emergency medication financial and purchasing assistance for medication to 241 patients. Additionally, medical insurance was secured for 35 patients.
- Referral and Continuity of Care: Twenty individuals living with epilepsy were referred to their nearest health centers to utilize government services, ensuring continuity of care.



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Generous Medication Donations: We received crucial medications, Lamotrigine and Levetiracetam, from our donor, ROW Foundation.

Home Monitoring Service: 910 patients benefited from regular nurse-led home check-ins, where their seizure status was and personalized monitored management advice was provided.



EEG and MRI Services: We offered EEG services to 33 individuals with epilepsy and provided MRI access to 19 individuals.

Transportation Support: We supported 470 patients by covering their transportation costs, ensuring they could attend clinic appointments and patient support group meetings.

Volunteer Surge Clinical Support: We have seen a significant increase doctors volunteering, boosting our training and clinical support. Sixteen volunteer neurologists and five volunteer psychiatrists participated in our clinic and EEG reading sessions.



At CareEpilepsy Ethiopia, we understand the importance of holistic wellbeing which encompasses more than just physical health. Therefore, we provide mental health support, nutritional guidance, physical titness programs,

OUR IMPACT: WELLBEING INITIATIVES

Group Therapy



- Telephone Helpline: 630 patients received vital information and advice, helping them navigate their epilepsy-related concerns and enhance their understanding.
- Coffee and Chat Morning: 225 individuals enjoyed our weekly sessions, connecting with peers and participating in craftwork, fostering creativity and reducing stress.
- Patient Support Group Meetings: 470 patients and families attended monthly meetings, providing a supportive space for sharing experiences and mutual encouragement.
- Counseling Service: 67 individuals accessed our professional counseling, addressing emotional and psychological challenges, and learning effective stress management techniques.

At CareEpilepsy Ethiopia, we are immensely proud of these wellbeing initiatives. They represent a holistic approach to supporting individuals with epilepsy, making a significant positive impact on their lives. Through comprehensive support and community engagement, we are transforming the lives of people with epilepsy in Ethiopia, driving meaningful change, and fostering a brighter future for our patients.

OUR IMPACT ON CLINICAL TRAINING AND EPILEPSY AWARENESS

Clinical Training, 13th - 14th February 2024

The National Epilepsy Week Clinical Training Program in Adama was a resounding success with 70 attendees from across Ethiopia, including General Practitioners, Health Officers, and nurses. Organized by the Ministry of Health, CareEpilepsy Ethiopia, and the Association of Ethiopian Neurologists, the two-day event empowered healthcare professionals with skills in epilepsy management, from diagnosis to psychosocial care.

Day 1 of the training program, held on February 13th, 2024, began with a warm welcome from Agitu Tadesse of the Ministry of Health, setting the tone for a day rich with invaluable insights into epilepsy. Yewnetu, Director of CareEpilepsy Ethiopia, alongside Dr. Helina and representatives of the Association Neurologists, outlined the training objectives, creating an atmosphere of collaboration and shared purpose.

The morning session started with Dr. Helina and Dr. Desalegen's overview of epilepsy, followed by Dr. Behailu and Dr. Desalegen on antiepileptic medication management. It ended with Dr. Behailu and Dr. Helina's tailored care strategies for pediatric epilepsy patients.

In the afternoon, the focus turned to the psychosocial aspects of epilepsy. Dr. Kibrom and Dr. Gadissa discussed stigma, mental health, and quality of life, while Dr. Gadissa also covered managing seizure emergencies. Enat Yewnetu highlighted the social burden of epilepsy and CareEpilepsy Ethiopia's proactive measures.

On February 14th, 2024, Day 2 focused on women's epilepsy issues. Dr. Gadissa and Dr. Mehila discussed epilepsy management during pregnancy, followed by a panel on epilepsy in pregnancy and elderly patients. In the afternoon, Enat Yewnetu and Sr. Meron led hands-on sessions on seizure first aid, while Dr. Etsegenet Tizazu covered care for epilepsy and HIV co-occurrence. The day was filled with interactive learning and skill-building.

We also trained 52 teachers, educated 1,550 students, and reached 255 employees various workplaces. These significantly enhanced epilepsy awareness and care, contributing to a more informed and supportive community.

achievements underscore our commitment to saving the lives of those affected by epilepsy and transforming perceptions and we take immense pride in the progress made during the first quarter.



EPILEPSY FOUNDATION TRAINING FOR SCHOOL TEACHERS AT ADAMA ON 17TH FEBRUARY 2024







One of CareEpilepsy Ethiopia's key initiatives is the Epilepsy Smart Schools Initiative, which strives to create a supportive and inclusive environment for children with epilepsy in schools. In Ethiopia, when a child starts having seizures, the first reaction is often to remove them from school. That's why we take training teachers seriously to support children with epilepsy.

This year's impactful training was held on February 17th, 2024. Led by Dr. Kindu Woldemichael and the dedicated CareEpilepsy staff, the training aimed to empower teachers with comprehensive knowledge of epilepsy management, helping children with epilepsy return to education. Participants gained insights into the causes, diagnosis, and psychosocial aspects of epilepsy, along with practical skills like seizure first aid. They also learned about the significant family burdens associated with epilepsy. This event underscored our commitment to training teachers about epilepsy, ensuring that every child can thrive in their educational journey.

THE WALK - 25TH FEBRUARY 2024

On Sunday, February 25th, 2024, as part of the National Epilepsy Week program, a spirited awareness-raising walk was held, marking a significant stride in our mission to raise awareness about epilepsy. Starting from Tewodros Avenue and culminating at the Ethio-Cuba Friendship Memorial Park on Churchill Avenue, the walk symbolized unity and determination to eradicate the stigma associated with epilepsy in our Adding to the community. atmosphere, the Federal Marshal Band accompanied our journey with uplifting melodies, amplifying the sense camaraderie.



Notably, representatives from the Ministry of Health, the World Health Organization (WHO), and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), as well as people affected by epilepsy, graced our event. With approximately 100 enthusiastic participants, our walk resonated with a shared commitment to raising awareness and fostering solidarity in the fight against the stigma of epilepsy.
