We would collect these in pairs and then think about how we could make the phrases a bit more positive, such as "Not right now Izzy! This would be a wonderful book to share with children a bit like Izzy who struggle to pay attention in class. The book also teaches about action and consequence which the children could discuss and predict what might happen next after Izzy does something she shouldn't. I love the part where all of the animals appear to almost be spilling out of the book and children would delight in manipulating the flaps to watch this happen. There's a lot of alliteration: "ponged a panda ... punched a penguin" which would be great for children to practice saying to build up their fluency and develop their understanding of speech. This could be a starting point for some animal poetry that the children could chant and perform to each other using drama, PE physical development and music.
