The last few years have been like none other. The Coronavirus pandemic has presented many challenges and brought all the community together to help, care and support each other.

The Parish Council have had to meet remotely using Zoom, and whilst these "on-line" meetings have been successful, we look forward getting back to face-to-face meetings.

The Parish Council has improved many of its protocols and procedures, which included a fit-for-purpose website.

We have implemented a Grant Application process, which provides the Parish Council with an Audit trail for all grant activity. The Parish Council has provided financial support to many worthwhile schemes.

The Parish Council's Biodiversity Project continues to be a great success.

Each year conservation plans are drawn up for the benefit of wildlife; the aim is to improve habitats for insects, bees and butterflies and in doing so enhance important green & blue spaces for residents and visitors alike. The Newbiggin Hall, Bedeburn, Callerton, Bank Foot and Woolsington Wards already contain wonderful landscapes, veteran trees and areas of lovely scenery. The Biodiversity Project is specifically designed to build on and enhance these natural assets.

Litter continues to be of concern to Parishioners. We are very grateful to the willing volunteers who have regularly helped to keep our public spaces looking respectable.

We continue to be represented on a number of local organisations and try to protect the interests of all residents. Newcastle City Councillors Linda Wright, Alex Hay, Jacqui Robinson and myself, have and will continue to work hard at the City Council to protect Parishioners' interests.

- to secure and improve our green and blue spaces for the entire community
- to protect and develop these habitats for nature in all its forms
- to join-up, maintain and enhance wildlife corridors for existing and future generations

Each of these objectives plays an important role in improving our quality of life and in maintaining our physical & mental health and well-being.

The Parish Council will not consider applications from individuals and projects that do not demonstrate social or economic benefits. Projects that are political or religious in nature will not be supported.

Woolsington Parish Council have previously provided financial support to all four schools in the Parish, this has been towards the cost of various schemes including Christmas activities, Biodiversity and new books to start the pupils on their reading journey. We have also supported Callerton Residents Association's Christmas Pantomime for the Children, the local charity D2 Youthzone, as well as assisting in getting the Galafield Café up and running. October 4 2021: Bluebell Dene Phase 1

As many are aware, Bluebell Dene was once a local beauty spot in Newbiggin Hall, through which runs the main footpath that connects the housing estate with the Metro Station and the surrounding areas of Bank Foot and Kingston Park.

In recent years many of the original bluebells and other spring flowers have died off and the area has become untidy and subject to increased anti-social behaviour.

Our Parish Council Biodiversity Project, "The Restoration of Bluebell Dene", aims to restore the area to its former glory. The objective of this initiative is to introduce a range of spring bulbs, including native bluebells, in a variety of locations throughout the Dene, in a carefully managed plan over the next few years.

The benefits will be multiple; not only will this enhance the attractive grassed areas and woodland but will also make a significant contribution in helping to improve the general health and well-being of the local community, whilst at the same time encouraging nature to thrive.

Costain Jacobs

The Parish Council would like to say a huge thank you to Costain Jacobs, the civil engineering company who are currently upgrading the A1, for its generosity in supporting the Bluebell Dene Project, Phase 1. Costain Jacobs supplied over 5000 spring bulbs, the mini daffodil Tête-à-Tête, together with a volunteer task force, who turned up in numbers on October 4th 2021 to help plant them.

All eyes are on the area next spring for a lovely cheery display.

Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) Receipt

CIL is a new levy that local authorities can charge on residential developments in their area to ensure facilities and services in the area have capacity to keep up with new homes and to enable further sustainable growth.

A part of the levy receipt is called the Neighbourhood Parish Portion which is transferred from Newcastle City Council to the Parish Council once year when certain triggers have been met. As we have started to receive these funds from the City Council we would welcome suggestions from the community, to enable a list to be drawn up of projects to spend this money on, to improve the parish and local area, this can be done by emailing the clerk at woolsingtonpc@gmail.com
