CROSSREACH REPORT TO THE CONGREGATION 2022

The remit of CrossReach is to provide social care services and specialist resources, in Christ's name, to people in challenging circumstances – to further the caring work of the Church. This continues the Kirk's long tradition of providing care and support which started back in 1869, over 150 years ago. The work of the organisation also includes helping to identify new areas of need and guiding the Church in approaches to relevant problems in society.

Those who depend on the support of CrossReach every day of the year include:

- People who are homeless
- People with drug and alcohol challenges
- People with learning disabilities
- People involved in the criminal justice system
- Children and young people with additional support needs, in particular those who require residential and educational support
- Children with disabilities
- Children and families requiring community support and early intervention
- People who need counselling
- People with dementia.

CrossReach has services all over Scotland, and is one of the largest social care agencies in the country. CrossReach strives to help those who are vulnerable through its values of compassion, openness and care. In short - CrossReach does "LOVE IN ACTION". But like most charitable social care organisations, it faces significant challenges. In their 2022 Report to the General Assembly, the staff were commended for their continued efforts throughout the past year in dealing with the challenges of the ongoing pandemic and thanks were expressed for their dedicated service in Christ's name.

The financial impact of Covid-19 was especially noted as it has affected all areas of the work of CrossReach – occupancy, recruitment, service delivery and fundraising.

Those who have financially supported CrossReach over the past year were warmly thanked. Every single penny can enhance, change and even save a life.

The General Assembly called on all churches to make CrossReach their charity of choice for the next year and beyond, so that services can be maintained and developed, and resources can be enhanced once again following the pandemic. It is to be hoped that our congregation will respond positively to that appeal.

In the meantime, purchasing items from the 2022 CrossReach Christmas Card and Calendar collection could be a way that you personally could help. Thank you.

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Who's kept a promise for nearly four hundred years?

In 1633 plague swept through the village of Oberammergau, just like it had across much of Europe. Like many others the people prayed, but in their case they did something else too. They vowed that if God halted the plague in their village they would celebrate the life of Jesus in a play about his life every ten years. The plague stopped. The next year the people of the village put on their play. And they are still doing it, every ten years, 388 years later.



Maureen and I were privileged to go to southern Germany this year to see the play recently. It is a long play. It takes all afternoon, a break for dinner, and then the second part in the evening.

About two thousand people, all from Oberammergau take part, many of them acting and singing, many others behind the scenes. The children take part in the afternoon. There were even live donkeys, sheep, horses and camels on stage!

The actors and singers are all ordinary people from every walk of life. You might see them in the shop the next day, or serving your meal at your hotel. That makes the play all the more powerful. They are not celebrity actors getting paid vast sums. They do it because they want to and because the story of God's love is so important to them. They all remember how God heard their prayer all these years ago and they still keep their promise to him.

I sometimes wonder about the promises we made to God; when we stood before him and said "I do" in the vows of marriage; or we joined the church and promised to take part in its life and worship; or we promised to bring up our children in the Christian faith by prayer and example.

We know God keeps his promises. How good have we been at keeping ours?

THERE were few people in the village who didn't know Ellen having lived here for more than 50 years.

Ellen was born in Dundee on 22nd Febru-

ary 1949 and moved to Letham along with husband Ken and her two daughters Michaelle and

husband Ken and her two daughters Michelle and Gillian in 1972.

They lived in The Square before moving to Blairs Road after son Gary came along. While raising her young family in the village Ellen worked in the Timex factory in Dundee.

But her true calling was nursing and so she embarked on her training. She started off her nursing career as an auxiliary at the old Whitehills Hospital in Forfar before completing her training and moving first to Kings Cross Hospital in Dundee and then Ninewells.

Ellen approached her nursing career like everything else in her life - with passion and dedication. And her nursing career followed her everywhere too - even after she retired in 2009 following her final stint in the minor illness and injury unit back at the new Whitehills.

Throughout her own treatment she continually came across nurses who knew her - or who knew of her. And it wasn't uncommon, whenever Ellen was in hospital herself, to find student nurses sitting by her bed gleaning as much knowledge as they could. She took great pride in helping them.

Some of the district nurses who cared for Ellen in her final weeks had started their careers working alongside her. They were looking after one of their own.

After she retired Ellen and Ken made a full time job out of having holidays! The two of them travelled the globe, some holidays were just the two of them - others with the family.

When she wasn't travelling she loved spending time with her family including her four grandchildren and four greatgrandchildren.

Ellen's main hobby though was walking. She joined the Brechin Ramblers after she retired and enjoyed many walking holidays. She did the West Highland Way - twice, the Great Glen Way, the moon walk, the kilt walk and countless other walks. In fact she used her passion for walking to deliver this very magazine to many of you.

She was committee chair of ramblers which was a role that played to her excellent organisational and leadership skills. She became quite the expert at 'voluntelling' people to help out on the committee (telling them to volunteer). She was rarely let down such was her influence and likability.

One of her rambler friends paid the perfect tribute to Ellen by saying 'her spirit will accompany us on future walks, like a friendly voice in our ears'.

Ellen was strong, resilient, brave, kind, funny, thoughtful, selfless and always always positive. She faced her illness head on and was utterly fearless throughout.

She died at home on October 9th surrounded by her loving family. She is deeply missed by them and all who knew her.

During the time of the Cyprus Emergency her father and family were posted there by the RAF. During curfew it was decided, as Linda looked like a little Greek girl, she should be sent to the shops. If there was trouble Linda always seemed to be around. This time she finished in the middle of a shoot-out between the Greeks and Turks with her and the shopkeeper cowering behind a stack of Heinz bean cans.

Nursing was to be her vocation. Married in the 1970s Linda was to become Mum to her two adored, beautiful daughters Susan and Kirsty. Then in the 1980s she trained as a Health Visitor generating a new set of stories to relate to friends.

At this point she started to settle down, forming new interests. She took up Wine Making, became a Wine Judge and she formed friendships across Scotland particularly in Kilmarnock, Perth, Monifieth, and, of course, Forfar.

In 1996, having known David for many years and after a whirlwind romance they married, and Katy was accepted into the family as one of her own.

Travelling was a big part of Linda's and David's life and saw them going round the world four, maybe five times. A common wish was to visit all Seven Wonders of the modern world which was achieved having visited Machau Pichu in 2015.

But Linda was a daredevil and for her 60th Birthday she bungee jumped from the 328 metre high Sky Tower in New Zealand not once but three times and then also tried paragliding.

Linda sponsored many projects including the local school library and sick bay plus the education of a couple of children in the Gambia.
