Yesterday, when I couldn't be bothered and couldn't see my way out of the fog and couldn't focus, Jesus was telling me, "Tomorrow's a new day, I've got your hand." He is

there for everyone, even if we are not always aware of it.

Youth and Safeguarding Report March 2023

The General Assembly of 2022 agreed substantial reform of Safeguarding Training for everyone working or holding positions within the Church of Scotland. This has been talked about for a number of years and is now in the process of being implemented.

There is now a requirement for all Elders to undergo a two-hour safeguarding training course every five years. Those people who have undergone PVG checking to allow them to work with children and other vulnerable groups must do an additional short training course to ensure they are kept up to date with all the current guidelines and practice.

The Elders here in Letham are currently attending these courses. Some are in person in Dundee but most are done via Zoom. The courses are very well run and highlight the importance of everyone being vigilant in dealings with children and other vulnerable groups.

We have a number of people who have completed the PVG checking process and we would be happy to welcome families with children of all ages to our worship. If you would like to join our team, and are willing to undergo the PVG checking process, please speak to Irene McGugan or Norma Craigon and we would be happy to give you more information.

Another important change is the recent implementation of a whistleblowing policy. The Church of Scotland, like many other organisations, requires all churches to have a whistleblowing policy.

Whistleblowing is when someone knows, or suspects, that there is some wrongdoing involving illegal or underhand practices occurring within the congregation and alerts the right person. Here in Letham, concerns should be referred to the Session Clerk, Irene McGugan, or the Interim Moderator, Rev Dr Karen Fenwick.

Any member of the congregation can raise concerns if they believe that a criminal offence has been committed, someone is failing in their legal duty, there is a Health & Safety breach or the congregation is attempting to conceal information about problems in these areas.

There will be an opportunity to properly thank Pat and Eric for their service at a later date, and information about this will feature in the May edition of "In the PICTure".



Fairtrade Fortnight Breakfast and Café Church

Why Fairtrade?

On Sunday 5th March Letham Church hosted a Fairtrade Breakfast followed by a service when the congregation was informed about Fairtrade.

So what is Fairtrade?

Fairtrade is one of the very few pushbacks against a global economic system designed to benefit the rich and powerful. It is one small attempt to bring about some fair play in what is an unrelentingly



unequal, economic environment. Fairtrade tries to provide farmers with a decent standard of living - enough



to cover all their farming costs and enough to cover their basic human rights, like a nutritious diet, children's education and healthcare and cope with environmental changes.

Fairtrade products come from many different places in the world

Sugar begins life as sugar cane and for the Fairtrade market this comes from Malawi in South Africa.

Working on a sugar cane plantation is hard work and of course used to be done by slaves but today, because of Fairtrade and the UK's Modern Slavery Act, it requires large companies to publicly report on the steps they are taking to ensure that forced labour is not a part of their products.

Bananas are a staple part of many peoples' diets and they come mostly from the Caribbean. If you have ever seen bananas being harvested, you will know it is a dangerous job.

Cotton comes from India, and Fairtrade supports around 20,000 small cotton growers, allowing them to rely on a wage and regular work.

Footballs. Did you know that in Sialkot, Pakistan, nearly half the population, that's around 40,000 workers, rely on making footballs for a living?

Chocolate. Cocoa beans are grown in Malaysia and for every bar of Fairtrade Chocolate you buy, you are supporting the farmers who grow the beans.

But Fairtrade is also about improving the local environment, problems such as the lack of access to clean, and safe water and raising awareness that the farmers and their families who have contributed least to the climate emergency, are forced to face some of the worst effects of the crisis. The irony is of course that many indigenous farmers know their lands; their techniques are often deeply eco-aware.

Over $\pounds 50$ of Fairtrade goods were sold at the church breakfast and $\pounds 161$ was raised in donations.

Look out for Fairtrade goods when you shop. And if you don't see them, ask for them and do your bit to make ours a fairer world.
