"Life is flux," said the philosopher Heraclitus. The Greek philosopher pointed out in 500 BC that everything is constantly shifting, and becoming something other than what it was before. - 6. a time to search and a time to give up, a time to keep and a time to throw away,
- 7. a time to tear and a time to mend, a time to be silent and a time to speak,
- 8. a time to love and a time to hate, a time for war and a time for peace.

Tim has been in touch to let us know about his latest initiative:

"Myself (Tim) and my friend Andy Reid are walking the 96 miles of the West Highland Way non-stop within 36 hours over 18th - 19th May. We are raising funds for a new charity that I'm the Treasurer of, called Friends of KNFU – a charity I helped set up in 2021.

All the money raised here in the UK goes to the work of Kings' Norton Foundation, Uganda, which provides education and assistance to children with additional support needs in Uganda. This is a hugely under resourced area of need in the country and KNFU makes a massive difference to the lives of young people with disabilities and their families.

WARM SPACES - LETHAM

Late last year, the Kirk Session decided to support this national initiative and open the Church Hall as a "warm space" for people to come to during these times of soaring fuel costs and a general cost of living crisis.

From January, the Hall has been open from 11am to 2pm every Friday. It was hoped that this would provide an opportunity for anyone who wished, to enjoy companionship, games and refreshments in a warm and informal setting.



While the Church was happy to contribute the "space" we have been overwhelmed by the generosity of others who contributed their time and resources to support this initiative.

Keptie Bakery donated bread, rolls and cakes every week. Keystore provided all the milk for the teas and coffees, and a dedicated band of chefs cooked up three different types of soup every week.

We also had a willing rota of volunteers who set up and cleared away, served at tables and did the washing up. And last but not least, we have applied for a grant of £2,000 from the Church of Scotland to cover the cost of electricity, which we are hopeful of being awarded.

A number of people have attended every week – others popped in less regularly, but all seemed to have appreciated their time together.

With the better weather now here, we have suspended this meantime, (the last event was 28th April) though the Kirk Session is giving consideration to whether and how we continue this successful venture next winter.

But the overriding aim of this article is to thank everyone involved for their tremendous generosity and for all their help in making this a success.





Annual Fabric Report

16th April 2023

Compared to recent years this last year has been absolutely dull and boring. There have been no major concerns with the church or hall, the main actions being to ensure that the relevant legislation and certification has been complied with.

However, because there haven't been capital issues, doesn't mean there aren't any on the horizon. Within the church, planning is ongoing regarding painting the fire exit doors and the Sanctuary door. All the external windows are also in need of painting — some are down to bare wood. It was hoped that the Community Justice Payback Team would help with this task though it hasn't transpired that way.

The church hall is about to undergo EICR certification – confirming the electrical work in the hall meets the standard required. This will be the first time since the hall was refurbished though no issues are expected.

Plans are being formulated for redevelopment of the grounds. Improving drainage at the gate where it floods, and improving egress through the fire exits are issues being scrutinized so that the grounds remain welcoming to visitors.

The bench in memory of Angus Watson, a stalwart of this church for many years, has been refreshed and is useable by all.

There are some issues at the Manse which Kirk Session will be considering and discussing with the General Trustees, as the General Trustees retain title though the congregation is responsible for the maintenance. This will be a case of "watch this space".

One issue which is reprehensible and which should be brought to the congregation's attention is the matter of the gentleman who allows his dog through the gate to foul the church lawn – and doesn't clean up after it. All members of the congregation are asked to watch for any such behaviour and report it to the Fabric Convenor.

For the year gone there are some thanks due. These are to Eric McCauley and Bruce Mair, who have maintained the flower beds, and further thanks to Eric for the beautiful planters he made and donated. Irene McGugan and Elaine Saunders have done a sterling job of supporting and advising the Fabric Convenor and helping source equipment.

Who knows what next year may bring? Surely not as dull a year as this last one! The next twelve months will tell.

Firmly Planted

Firmly Planted is a community-based agroforestry initiative with the ambition of making a sustainable impact across Malawi, Zambia and Zimbabwe. It is spearheaded by our partners in the Church of Central Africa Presbyterian (CCAP), and built around

the church's community structures. The initiative will resource individual groups to respond to the various challenges affecting Malawi today.

Agroforestry presents an opportunity to address challenges of food insecurity, deforestation, climate change and youth unemployment. Tree nurseries create employment opportunities, fruit trees improve nutrition and wider tree planting helps mitigate the impact of the climate crisis, in turn improving agricultural productivity.

Firmly Planted will provide community-based training tailored to the community's needs, ensuring woodlots are well maintained to have the greatest chance to thrive.

The programme, through effective distribution, looks to attain large-scale tree planting of locally relevant woodlots – these could be linked to schools, churches, clinics and community groups. Having already established a pilot tree nursery, CCAP is looking to replicate this across the Synods by implementing Central Tree Nursery Hubs allowing each nursery to grow tree seedlings based on the needs of their communities.

This year's stamp appeal proceeds will go towards establishing the tree nurseries.
