FAIRTRADE

When you hear the word 'Fairtrade', what do you think of - bananas? coffee? chocolate? These are some of the most common Fairtrade products but there are many others. Here's one which you may not know about shea (pronounced 'shay' in the UK) butter.

What is shea butter?

It's a natural moisturiser produced from fat that's extracted from the nut of the shea tree. These trees grow in the wild in Africa.

How is shea harvested?

Shea nuts are harvested from the trees, then sorted, crushed, roasted and ground. Producers then whip and separate shea butter by hand. This is done mainly by women (around 10 million women today collect shea nuts for processing), but they rarely reap a rich reward and it's hazardous work, with long days and risks to their health.

The difference Fairtrade makes

Buying products containing Fairtrade shea butter means the women earn a fairer price for their product.

What can we do?

Shea butter is an ingredient in many everyday beauty, wellness and cosmetic products, including sunscreen, lipstick and soaps. Consider asking your favourite beauty brand to start using <u>Fairtrade</u> shea butter.

AID TO UKRAINE

In the early stages of the conflict in Ukraine, Kirk Session gave some thought to the ways in which we might support the people of that country.

Believing in the power of prayer, the first thing we initiated was that every service held in our church, would include a prayer for Ukraine. We have held to this promise and every Sunday we ask God's blessing on those most affected by the war, and that the suffering of so many will soon be ended and hostilities ceased.

However we also wanted to offer some practical help, and so decided to link in with the national Church of Scotland initiative to provide aid via our partners in The Reformed Church in Hungary. So, on the first Sunday of every month, we have a donation basket in the Sanctuary, in order that those wishing to support the humanitarian effort in Ukraine have a means of doing so.

At the General Assembly at the end of May, the Faith Impact Forum reported that £430,000 had been gifted by Church of Scotland members to help the people of Ukraine. This has been distributed by The Reformed Church in Transcarpathia, The Reformed Church in Hungary, Hungarian Church Aid and St Columba's Church of Scotland in Budapest.

Thank you to all who assisted with this humanitarian effort.

FREE COFFEE GROUNDS FOR YOUR GARDEN

Many gardeners use coffee grounds as a fertilizer, and there are a few reasons why adding coffee grounds to the soil around your plants can help them grow strong: aeration, drainage and water retention are all improved when organic matter – like coffee grounds – is added to the soil. Also, worms are attracted to coffee grounds, and their presence can help improve the quality of the soil.

Coffee grounds also support the lives of microorganisms that keep soil healthy and can act as mulch for your plants, blocking sunlight from soil and inhibiting the growth of weeds. Many gardeners also find that coffee grounds seem to repel slugs and other pests that feed on garden plants. If you struggle with cats using your garden soil as a litterbox, you'll be happy to know that felines tend to stay away from gardens that have been fertilized with coffee grounds.

Just sprinkle them on top of the soil or mulch and work them into the top layer of soil. Acid loving plants in particular love used coffee grounds. These include:

Azaleas	Blueberries
Camellias	Daffodils
Hydrangeas	Mountain heather
Nasturtiums	Rhododendrons

But the advice is to keep coffee away from tomato plants.

The good news is that if you wish to try this, you can get used coffee grounds free of charge, on request, from Keystore. The new coffee machine there is proving very popular and generating lots of used grounds which Rag and Kurtis would like to "recycle" rather than just throw away.

So good news for our eco credentials and good news for our gardens.
