It also allows us to mark special occasions such as Dave Lumgair's 50 years as an elder which was held just a few weeks ago. During 2023 we were delighted to be able to hold a number of events. Covid prevented all social events and it has taken some time to have the confidence to return to pre-Covid times.

To help support people who were finding heating bills rising, we opened the hall on Fridays from January until April as part of the national Warm Spaces events. We were grateful to the Keptie Bakery for the donation of cakes and the KeyStore for the donation of milk every week.

28th May saw us hosting a lunch to say thank you to Pat and Eric Walker on their last Sunday with us. Generous donations provided a beautiful display of delicious food and it was a truly memorable occasion.

TALES OF LETHAM No. 1

CARMYLLIE, LETHAM AND COLOGNE: what is the connection??

When Letham village was established in 1789 (only 43 years after the Battle of Culloden) the new built houses in this new Letham were eventually all floored with "modern" Carmyllie slabs.

These were of solid stone from the alluvial sandstone quarried at Carmyllie. These slabs were big and heavy, in hernia making proportions, and must have been brought to Letham by horse and cart. They were obviously hewn, handled and laid when men were men.

My previous house in The Square was built in 1828, some 39 years after the village founding date. The house will be about 200 years old now.

Some 40 years ago, when we were modernising it, a surprise operation came mid week in my summer holiday. My surgeon, whilst investigating another ailment entirely, invited me to jump up on the bench, "to check things out since you're here anyway". So he performed an unscheduled groping sequence, the outcome of which was the diagnosis that I had two hernias. He was delighted to learn that I was on my week long summer holiday so I was asked to attend Stracathro Hospital the next day. He obviously had a thin list for hernia operations for the following day. I did not have the courage to tell him that I was spending my holiday laying Carmyllie slabs.....

Carmyllie slabs enjoyed an international appeal and market. A railway line from Carmyllie to Arbroath Harbour was installed. Boatloads of slabs went off to markets worldwide.

And a boatload was destined for the flooring on part of the Dom Kirche in Cologne. I have visited the Dom Kirche and walked on its floor. I have also walked on the floor of the pre-modernisation of the house in Letham. And in its garden too. Quite a connection.





February

Is the second month of the year in both of the Julian and Gregorian calendars. It was probably named after the Latin term "Februum" which means "purification". The ritual was held on the Full Moon in the old lunar calendar.

The month has normally 28 days but every Leap Year has 29 days to catch up with the Earth's yearly rotation round the Sun. It is the third and last month of the meterological winter in the Northern Hemisphere.

February is famous for Valentines Day which is celebrated on the14th. Although there were several Christian martyrs named Valentine, Valentine's Day may have taken its name from a priest who was martyred about 270 CE by the Roman emperor Claudius II Gothicus.

Other accounts hold that it was St. Valentine of Terni, a bishop, for whom the holiday was named, though it is possible that the two saints were actually one person.

Valentine's Day is when lovers express their affection with greetings and gifts. Given their similarities, it has been suggested that the holiday has origins in the Roman festival of Lupercalia, held in mid-February.

The festival, which celebrated the coming of spring, included fertility rites and the pairing off of women with men by lottery.

At the end of the 5th century, Pope Gelasius I forbade the celebration of Lupercalia and is sometimes attributed with replacing it with St. Valentine's Day, but the true origin of the holiday is vague at best. Valentine's Day did not come to be celebrated as a day of romance until about the 14th century.


