LATEST NEWS ABOUT FORFAR ALL SOULS @ LETHAM CHURCH

On Sunday 28th January, all five congregations voted in favour of both the Basis of Union and the Basis of Team Ministry and these votes were approved by the Presbytery of Perth at its meeting on Saturday 3rd February.

This provides a good base from which we can move forward with the congregations of Aberlemno, Guthrie and Rescobie, Forfar Lowson Memorial, and Forfar St Margaret's, with our Ministry Team of Rev Dr Karen Fenwick, Rev Maggie Hunt, and Rev Heather Gourlay.

A meeting of the joint Kirk Sessions took place in Letham on Thursday 15th February. This served as an opportunity to meet fellow Elders but also as a way of planning for how the new, united Kirk Session will be established and how it will function.

It has also been agreed that a service of Union will take place on Thursday 21st March at 7 p.m. in Lowson Memorial Church, Forfar. This important (indeed historic) occasion marks the official beginning of Forfar All Souls Church of Scotland. We hope for a large representation from Letham, and transport can be provided if required.

While this is a very significant change for our church and will require a lengthy period of adjustment, in many ways, nothing will change for our members. There will still be a service on Sunday mornings at 10:30 a.m. to which everyone is welcome, and these services will be led by one of our "Team" with the occasional "guest" preacher.

FAIRTRADE & ECO CONGREGATION RE-PORT. FEBRUARY 2024

FAIRTRADE

Margaret Moore was the Fairtrade contact person for our congregation for a number of years until last year, and we offer our sincere thanks to her for all the time and effort which she put into helping people to understand more about Fairtrade and enabling them to purchase Fairtrade goods. Fairtrade tea and coffee are used every week for Church activities.

During Fairtrade Fortnight last year, on Sunday 5th March, a Fairtrade Breakfast/Café Church was held in the church hall. This was well attended and much appreciated, thanks to the hard work of the Social Group and all their helpers. Fairtrade Fortnight 2024 will be from 9th - 22nd September.

We encouraged people who like to buy advent calendars for family or friends, to buy the Real Advent Calendar. These were different from most which were available in supermarkets etc. because they used Fairtrade chocolate, and they included a book which explained the real meaning of Christmas - which sadly is something many children these days know little or nothing about. We are happy to order Fairtrade goods (tea, coffee, etc) on behalf of members, or if you prefer it I can give you details of web sites where you can browse and see what is available and order things yourself.

ECO CONGREGATION

We have a silver award from Eco-Congregation Scotland. The following are some of the ways in which we have tried in the past year to make our Church more eco friendly.

A wildflower garden was planted in the Church grounds by the local Cubs. This resulted in a wonderful display of colour and is a reminder for us of the need to provide areas which will benefit wildlife.

For the Church and Church hall, we source as many of our materials as possible (toilet rolls, napkins, etc.) from ethical and 'green' sources, and we use a recyclable bottle of spray and reusable cloths for cleaning, instead of disposable wipes,

The Church light bulbs have all been changed to more eco friendly ones, and the old ones have been recycled.

General 'rubbish' has been recycled wherever possible rather than simply being binned.

Advice has been given about different ways in which used coffee grounds can benefit our gardens.

TALES OF LETHAM No. 2 STONES SALUTING OUR PAST

"I've seen many a ruined building, but never a ruined stane." (Hugh McDiarmid)

He's nae oan aboot stanes again is 'e? No, he is going on about the founding of the village in 1789. Well, stanes do come into the tale.

What was the political flavour of the moment in 1789? The effects of the new Union between Scotland and England (1707) were emerging. The existing farm of Letham



seemed to fit the bill for the need of the moment. Those who could manufacture linen were encouraged with favourable assistance, so the Landlord George Dempster of Dunnichen, who was an MP at Westminster, created a planned village called Letham, solely to manufacture linen on farmland which was on his estate.

When one was bent on creating an Empire, as the new Union seemed to be, one of the priorities was manufacturing sales, because without sales you are going nowhere, certainly not over the entire world. Basically without sales you cannot create an Empire.

At the back doors of many of the original Letham houses, are single stones, some nicely hewn in squares, some tapering in a round shape and some just looking like wee boulders. However, they all have something in common. They all have a rounded metal hoop embedded in lead in the stone. Many owners of old Letham houses have such a stane at their back door or in their back garden. Some have no idea what it was for, but it seemed to come with the house. The origin of Letham, created by the needs of the past, was weaving linen in every house in the village. These stones were attached to the house loom to act as a weight to propel the weaving shuttle from side to side. As far as we know such loom stones are all that remain of the village commercial activity of over 200 years ago.

To possess such a stone today is a privilege. These stones serve as a salute to the past industry of this village and are a reminder of the hard work and survival of our village forebears in the challenging years gone by.

Ninety Years Young

Birthday congratulations to Mrs. Christine Fraser who at the start of February celebrated going into her tenth decade.



'Teenie', as she is usually called, takes a walk around the village every day and is very well known. She is a popular member of The Happy Wanderers and Line Dancing Class, amongst others, and recommends keeping active and taking an interest in village affairs. She is also an active member of the Pensioners Committee.

The New Presbytery of Perth

Over the last few years, the Church of Scotland has made changes to its structure to prepare for future challenges. Presbyteries across the country have been amalgamated to improve efficiency and better support congregations.

The new presbytery of Perth was formed on January 1st 2023, from the merger of the former presbyteries of Angus, Dundee, Dunkeld and Meigle, Perth and Stirling. It is the only new presbytery to take its name from one of its legacy presbyteries but the current Clerk to the Presbytery, Rev Dr John Ferguson, says the name makes sense, "Perth is the geographical centre and it's where the presbytery office is." There should be 92 ministers to serve 154 congregations but there are currently 47 of the 92 charges vacant.

Reflecting on the first year, Dr Ferguson says that there have been many positives, but that it has been 'challenging at times' to get to grips with a presbytery that skirts the Central belt to the south, the Cairngorms National Park to the north, Loch Lomond and the Trossachs National Park to the west, and stretches up the east coast from the River Tay to Montrose. From its westernmost point, Drymen, to Montrose is a drive of about 103 miles.

"There has been a lot of work to establish the presbytery," he says. "We are meeting 4 times a year and we are now switching to hybrid (a mixture of online and in-person) meetings which I think is the best option. We are getting there, but it's adjusting to a new way of working and also the sense that we want to do things differently. The whole point was not to just lump the presbyteries together and do the same things."

He admits that 'of course' there is a lot of unhappiness about buildings closing. "But it's the reality that we've just got far too many buildings and it doesn't make sense to keep them all going."

More positively, Dr Ferguson says he is 'really pleased' with the team that has formed at the office. "One of the positive things about larger presbyteries is we have got the budget to employ staff. We have got staff to support congregations in relation to governance, buildings, finance and so on."

Asked where he hopes the presbytery will be in 5 years, Dr Ferguson says, "I'd love to get to a point where we are settled in our buildings, so congregations can concentrate primarily on what really matters, which is mission, and Presbytery is seen as being there to support that."

Sheila Mary Hawick was the wife of the late Arthur, much loved mum of Kenneth and Gavin, a very proud granny of Craig and Shelby and great-granny of Amoria, and a dear and caring friend. All who knew her will have very special memories of this loving person. They will be all the more precious in the days to come and smile, as this is how she would like to be remembered.

Sheila was born on the 6th of July 1935 in Edinburgh. Sadly she lost her dad when she was only ten years old but even at that young age she was always ready to help in any way she could. After school she worked for the National Coal Board. She met Arthur, who was in the Merchant Navy, at a dance and they married in 1964. They had two sons, Kenneth and Gavin and in time became very proud grandparents and great grandparents. When the boys were young they had very happy holidays at Dunbar and Pitlochry and after Arthur passed his driving test they enjoyed lots of picnics.

Sheila returned to work in her forties, serving as an assistant occupational therapist at the Victoria Hospital. She and Arthur then moved to Banffshire where Sheila ran a Bed and Breakfast for 9 years. Everywhere she lived she was an active Church member, keen on the Woman's Guild, and enjoyed craftwork and local spinning and knitting groups. When she and Arthur came to Letham in 2001 she again supported the local Church and Guild and helped set up a local knitting group. She loved doing crochet and in her house there are some beautiful sown pictures.

Wherever Sheila was living she liked to help people in many ways. She increasingly needed to care for Arthur at home as his health became poorer and he passed away in December. Sheila too had become housebound but she kept as active as she could with her art skills and making lovely pots of homemade soup and being delighted when she saw the family she loved so much. Sheila was always looking on the bright side, even last month when in hospital, where she was very positive with the staff and made the nurses laugh. She will be sadly missed, especially by her loved ones and they are in our thoughts and prayers.

Her funeral took place on Thursday 8th February at Parkgrove Crematorium, which was conducted by Rev Brian Ramsay to whom thanks for the content of this obituary.
