FOODBANK NEW ARRANGEMENTS

For many years now, Letham Church has been supporting the Trussell Trust Angus Food Bank initiative based in Forfar. Last year, for administrative purposes, it became the Dundee and Angus Food Bank, and we understand that its already limited 3 day opening is to be reduced to 2 days per week.

One implication of this is that the food project at Lowson Memorial Church has been almost overwhelmed by demand, as people in need go there for support when other options are not available.

Lowson Memorial does two large food drop offs on Wednesday and Friday, but also supplies local groups (Toddlers, Pensioners' Lunch Club and local school nursery.) They can also respond if someone makes contact needing immediate help. And there is no need for an official referral system to be able to access this support.

The Elders at Letham Church have therefore decided that in future our food and other donations will be taken to Lowson Memorial to help meet that increased demand. Our reasons for this are that there is greater accessibility during the week for families requiring support; the church benefits from donations of fresh food in addition to tins and packets etc.; there is no requirement for individuals and families to be referred by an agency in order to access food etc.; there is also the reassurance that all of our donations remain in the Forfar and Letham areas; plus it is another way in which churches in the All Souls Union can work together in mission and outreach.

We hope that our regular contributors will agree with this new arrangement and continue to give generously. Thank you. Irene McGugan

Extract from Treasurer's Report 12/05/24

As you are all aware, Dunnichen, Letham & Kirkden Church no longer exists as a separate entity. On 1st April 2024 we became part of Forfar: All Souls with Aberlemno and Lowson Memorial churches. We, in this church, are now known as Forfar: All Souls @ Letham. Having been without a Minister since 2019, we are now lucky enough to be part of a Team Ministry, with one of three Ministers preaching each week.

Income

In 2023 81% of our income was made up of donations (plus Gift Aid where appropriate) via standing orders/other donations (39 members) or the open plate (an unknown number). The average attendance at services was 26. There were 191 names on the roll at the end of 2023. Not everyone at services donates via the open plate, as they have Standing Orders, so, if we say that 13 people donate this way then approximately **73%** of members do not contribute to the costs of the church. How do we encourage those members of our church family to help out? If you do decide to start giving and you are a taxpayer, please, please fill in a Gift Aid declaration form, available from the church office in Lowson Church.

Expenditure

We always try to minimise our costs, but the church is as affected by rising costs as you all are. The building still has to be maintained to keep it in good order. The solar panels help to reduce our electricity costs, but this has been negated over the past year by the enormous rise in the price per unit and the standing charges.

TALES OF LETHAM STANES No. 5

"I've seen many a ruined building,

but never a ruined stane." (Hugh McDiarmid)

A STANE THAT SPEAKS TO US FAE LANG SYNE - PART 1

The auld stane featuring in "In the PICTure" for the next two months is not in fact a stane. It is a glass fibre replica of a Pictish Standing Stone. Some years ago, the folk in Angus County were blessed with a good man. He was Sheriff Kermack. Apart from dispensing justice from the Bench, he was a fervent advocate for the history of Angus and Scotland.

The replica Dunnichen Stone stands proudly today on the rectangle of grass across from the gate into Dunnichen Kirk. The original stone was discovered nearby by a ploughman on the land of the old Dunnichen estate.

The ploughed up stone was erected in the centre of the walled garden of Dunnichen big hoose. It stayed there as the centerpiece of the garden for many decades.

However, in the passage of time, the stone found itself on a list of a specialist Government body tasked with taking care of old historical stones, all of which were at risk of manmade air pollution and acid rain.

So, without a "by your leave", or permission of any sort, workmen arrived in the garden and it was removed. As far as we knew, it was taken away to an unknown place. However, in 1963, actors in the newly restored Arbroath Abbey Pageant found the stone stored in the Abbey.

Then along came Regionalisation (remember that?) – Tayside Region incorporated everywhere from Kinloch Rannoch to Montrose, with Dundee as the centre. The Dunnichen stone was taken to Dundee – centralization don't you know?

Years later, when Regionalisation came to an end, Angus Council took on the role of local government here.

There was a battle between Dundee and Forfar as to who should inherit the stone. Forfar won, and the stone was placed in the Meffan Institute, where it is to this day. JAMc


