Following the sell-out success of the inaugural The Magpies Festival in 2021, we're thrilled that the festival returns to Sutton Park in 2022.

Run by Yorkshire-based transatlantic folk band, The Magpies, The Magpies Festival is rooted in the band's native Yorkshire, where the band first met. The local community is central to the festival's ethos, which aims to support local businesses and provide opportunities for emerging local musicians.

The all-female band are set on championing gender equality in the music industry, achieving gender parity in both line-up and staff, as well as providing a safe and comfortable environment for female musicians and festival goers.

Festival Director Holly Brandon says, "We are so excited to put on The Magpies Festival and for it to be even bigger and better than our first year. We were over the moon at the response to 2021's festival, from the incredible performances from world class folk musicians to the high energy spirit that our attendees brought along, it felt like a whole new feel to a folk festival."

ARRIVING AT THE FESTIVAL

VENUE ADDRESS

Sutton Park, Main Street, Sutton on the Forest, York, YO61 1DP

Gates will open at 12:30 on Friday 12th August. Music will start at 18:00, but we'd recommend that campers give themselves plenty of time to get set up and settled in before the music kicks off.

ARRIVING BY CAR


If you are arriving by car, free parking is available via **Gate A** on York Road. Approaching from the York direction, Gate A is on the right, 0.5 miles before you reach the village of Sutton-on-the-Forest. To navigate to the exact location, you can use the What3Words app with the reference quicksand.forces.lance.

ARRIVING ON FOOT, BIKE OR PUBLIC TRANSPORT

Sustainability is an important part of our ethos and we encourage you to travel by public transport, or on foot or by bike if possible.

The site can be reached from York Railway Station via the no. 40 bus. It is just a 25 minute journey to Sutton-on-the-Forest Primary School bus stop and a 1 minute walk to the festival gate. We'd recommend checking the timetable carefully, as buses do not run late, so if you aren't camping, we recommend booking a taxi to leave the site.

If you are entering the site on foot, please enter via **Gate B**, which is the main entrance for Sutton Park, off Main Street. Follow signs for Sutton Park and Miss Daisy's Tea Rooms. The What3Words reference is under.instincts.trifle. Bike storage is also available at Gate B for cyclists.

MAIN STAGE: SATURDAY, 21:50

A singer, songwriter, fiddler and multiple BBC Radio 2 Folk Award winner, Seth Lakeman is one of the most renowned folk musicians in the UK. His 2005 album, Kitty Jay, was nominated for the Mercury Music Prize, whilst its gold-selling follow-up, Freedom Fields, spawned the hit singles Lady of the Sea and The White Hare.

Born in Essex, raised by the Devon seaside, and making his bones in the bars and clubs of Liverpool, John Smith has released eight albums with over 55 million Spotify streams. He has played to audiences all over the world in living rooms, festival tents and sold-out concert halls. He is a genuine folksinger, an inquisitive truth-seeker, devoted song interpreter and enchanting writer.

RORY BUTLER

BRASS CASTLE STAGE: SATURDAY, 18:25

Growing up in Edinburgh, Rory spent his early twenties in London. His first single peaked at #6 on the Spotify 'Viral' chart. Total streaming figures now exceed 800,000. But really, you need to be in the room. It's like watching a young Jackson Browne

KATIE SPENCER

BRASS CASTLE STAGE: SATURDAY 14:25

Katie Spencer is a singer-songwriter and guitarist from Yorkshire who writes songs imbued with the Northern landscapes of her home. Originally from Hull, the grainy imagery of the docks and sea-fronts seep

into songs of nostalgia, loss and love. Artists like Joni Mitchell and John Martyn, flow into her sound, carrying with them the warmth and idealism of the early 70's folk and songwriter movements.

BRASS CASTLE STAGE: SATURDAY 20:50

CAMPING

Overnight camping is available for campervans, motorhomes, caravans and tents from 12:30 on Friday 12th August until midday on Sunday 14th August for £15 per person, on top of the day ticket price. The campsite is located in stunning parkland on the edge of the forest and moments from the main stage.

FAQs

What facilities are there in the campsite?

Separate toilets are available in the campsite, but no electricity hook-ups are available on site.

Are campfires allowed?

No fires, BBQs, Chinese lanterns or fireworks are allowed anywhere on the site, including the campsite.

Can I park my car by my tent?

Yes, it is possible to drive from the carpark into the campsite. However, no vehicles are permitted to move around the site after 11pm.

SUTTON PARK



Sutton Park was built in the 18th century by Thomas Atkinson for Philip Harland and is now the family home of Sir Reginald, the 8th Baronet Sheffield and his wife, Lady Sheffield.

When the Sheffields bought the house in 1963, they brought with them much of their art collection from Normanby Park in Lincolnshire. Large parts of this collection were originally from Buckingham House, now known world-wide as the Queen's official residence - Buckingham Palace.

The Grade I listed building is a fine example of early Georgian architecture, with magnificent Rococo plasterwork by Cortese. It houses an important collection of porcelain as well as many other treasures, all put together with great style. The Gardens at Sutton Park were awarded Gold in the 2019 Yorkshire in Bloom awards.



The Magpies Festival is a family-friendly festival. It's hugely important to us to make sure that children are introduced to live music.

They'll have the freedom to run around beautiful parkland whilst listening to some brilliant musicians showing them what they can achieve with a little practice. We hope to see them on the stage in a few years!

Each child is welcome to collect an activity pack when they arrive, just ask for one at the Info Point. There will also be a music workshop for children at 11am on Saturday morning. Children are welcome with or without an instrument.

Please note that parents/guardians are responsible for children under the age of 16.

Parents/guardians will be asked to write their mobile phone number on the wristbands of children under the age of 11.

Lost children

Any lost children, or parents who have lost a child, should inform a festival steward or report to the Information Point (see map) immediately.

THE SERIOUS BIT

- 1. No fires, BBQs, fireworks, pyrotechnics or Chinese lanterns are allowed anywhere on the festival site
- 2. No alcohol is to be brought into the festival arena
- 3. No glass is to be brought onto the festival site
- 4. Dogs must be kept on a lead at ALL times and dog owners must clean up after their dogs and dispose of all waste correctly
- 5. Festival wristbands, issued on arrival, must be worn at all times
- Vehicles are not permitted to move on the site after 11pm, unless with special permission or in case of emergency
- 7. All rubbish should be disposed of in the bins provided or taken home with you.
- 8. In the case of an emergency, report to the Information Point (see map), which will be manned by trained stewards throughout the festival's operating hours (12.30pm-12.30am on Friday 12th August and 10am-12.30am on Saturday 13th August). WHAT SHOULD I BRING?

1.Camping chairs or picnic blankets

There will be no seats provided in front of the stage. So, to ensure a comfy day, please bring your own chairs.

2.A reusable water bottle

Help us keep the single-use plastics to a minimum and bring your own bottle which can be refilled on site.

3. Weather appropriate clothing

Check the forecast and pack your waterproof and woolly socks or sunhat and suncream accordingly – or both! As Alfred Wainwright said 'there's no such thing as bad weather, only unsuitable clothing'.

4. Camping equipment

If you're camping, make sure you pack everything you need for the night, as facilities and local amenities are limited.

5. A bag to take your rubbish home

Please make sure you leave the site the way you found it and dispose of all rubbish either in the bins provided or, better still, at home.

LEAVING THE FESTIVAL

Programmed music will finish at 00:15 on Friday and 00:05 on Saturday. There will be a session in the bar until late, with the bar open until 01:30. All day ticket holders will be expected to leave the site by 01:30.

Please make sure that you do this as swiftly and quietly as possible, to ensure that the festival does not disturb any residents of Sutton-on-the-Forest.

If you will be leaving the site by taxi, please make sure you book in advance to avoid delays.

All campers must leave the festival site by midday on Sunday.

Please make sure when you leave the site that you do not leave any rubbish behind.
