"All that women require is training, experience and support from corporate and financial institutions." Khanyi believes that a lot can be learnt from many women in construction. "My personal experience working with women in construction is that they don't build a house and simply walk away. They build communities and stick around."

I am very happy therefore to now be in a position where I can use my skills, insight and experience to help meet Standard Bank's Affordable Housing goals, which also benefits society and communities at large," says Khanyi
