WILDLIFE AT LAWFORD LANE

Nick Green reports that the Met Office stated that 2022 was the fifth warmest year on record though the snow and freezing period before Christmas would have lowered those averages! Another frosty period was experienced in early January.

Local birds recorded were the usual suspects, Carrion Crow, Magpies, Jay, Woodpigeon, Collared Dove, Green and Great Spotted Woodpeckers, Blackbird, Song Thrush, Robin (a songster all year), Dunnock, Greenfinch and Chaffinch,

Close by in Admirals Park was a Drake Teal in the December cold snap and a recent sighting of a Kingfisher whilst the fallow field close to Writtle University College boasted 4 Yellowhammers, 2 Linnets and a Reed Bunting in January whilst another member, Dawn Crisp noted 2 Little Egrets in the roadside ditch opposite the Uni buildings.

Following on from his 'Notable Events' published in the last issue, Nick has again gone down memory lane to Saturday March 19th, 1985, when he suggests he reached the pinnacle of his footballing prowess as a regular member of the Saturday 6th XI....by scoring his one and only hat-trick for the club. He recalls this as a proud moment for someone who previously had only scored the occasional goal and who was moved about in the team line-up from right back to right midfield and occasionally to right wing which demanded a far greater level of fitness. The opposition that day were Sedgwick Reserves on their pitch somewhere on the outskirts southwest of Witham and whilst not able to find the names of all the players that day, Nick recalls the other scorers included (Nick??) Ward 4; D. Marsh; M. Marsh, Alan Dann and Steve Brewer. Happy memories.

In looking for the team sheet for that game Nick unearthed this photograph of the rescue party that assisted half a dozen or more drivers off the temporary carpark used at Ricky Richmond's memorial service at the club

on November 14th 2014. Much was written at the time of those proceedings conducted by Ricky's son-in-law and our current President, Jez Crook, and of Ricky's service to both School and Association over his lifetime, but Nick had jotted down his own thoughts on a memorable, though tiring day which accompanied this photo and which we precis here.

The day had started to torrential rain which showed no sign of abating so Nick wisely changed into walking boots and wetweather gear.

Having arrived early at the club he just had time, in a short dry spell, to put up three previously cleaned nest boxes before assisting Callum McClean, Bernie Oram and the ever-present Brian Terry to martial cars on to the main carparks before sending some onto the waterlogged playing-field and when this was full to an overflow spot on farmland off Lawford Lane.

Having dried themselves off and cleaned themselves up as best they could, they were then able, belatedly, to join the service and to catch up with those others present afterwards.



All was well until guests started to leave. with those on the field and farmland finding it impossible to get any tyre grip on the sodden ground.....and calling for help.



Initial attempts by Nick, Bernie, Callum and Brian to hand-push the cars off the cloying clay proved ineffectual and the club tractor, with first ropes and then chains was called in to play and after a lot of wheelspin and mud showers, excellent teamwork prevailed and all the stranded cars were pulled clear and freed.

Grateful drivers made generous donations to their rescuers – money that went into Ricky's charity box rather than over the bar as intended – and after further changes of clothes a well-earned beer or two was enjoyed with the remaining company into the early evening.

Ricky was of course a renowned joker and prankster and the overriding thought of the day was just how much he would have enjoyed the chaos caused on the day – his day – whilst his family and friends rejoiced in his having this one last laugh at our expense in the warm evening sunshine after the earlier rains!

CORPS OF DRUMS

John Baker wrote "I was interested to see the fine photograph taken in the garden of the Judges' Lodgings c. 1964. The judge in the centre is Lord Parker of Waddington, then Lord Chief Justice - I remember meeting him in the 1960s.



The arms on the trumpet banners must indeed be those of the high sheriff. Judges' arms were not used on trumpet banners because the judges represented the sovereign - and because the trumpeters were employed by the sheriff. (I amassed £1. 11s. 6d. in all, from two sheriffs, not to mention three luncheons, during my brief career as a professional musician.) It was common armigerous sheriffs to have their trumpet banners framed as a memento of their year of office, and they turn up occasionally at auctions.

I had dinner recently with Judge Gratwicke, honorary Recorder of Chelmsford, who is collecting pictures relating to Chelmsford assizes to adorn the corridors of the court building. If there are any more assize photographs out there, I would be glad to collect them (or good quality copies), since I don't necessarily need the originals, and forward them to His Honour.

John Aldridge, on being copied in to this correspondence, suggests that although the photo was supplied by Bob Parsons it belonged to his younger brother, Dick, who appears in the photo on the left and who it was thought knew all the judges in this photo by name.

Dick too has suggested that the trumpet banners were probably those of the High Sheriff and John believes that they have such arms related to the role and if so, wasn't certain who the High Sheriff was that year.

If this picture were c1964 this could have been Brig Edward Joseph Todhunter of Threshers, Harlow whilst earlier High Sheriffs in the early 60s were 1960, Charles Hubert Archibald Butler of Shortgrove, Newport, 1961, Christopher William Oxley Parker of Faulkbourne Hall 1962, Douglas Gurney Pelly of Swaynes Hall, Widdongton and 1963, Col Hugh Edward Hunter Jones of Felix Place, Kelvedon.

'Spitfire' Nelson had wanted to be a pilot and enlisted as soon as he was old enough but because he had poor eyesight, had to settle for being an engineer on Spitfires and Hurricanes after joining the RAF in 1941 and was shipped out to Libya where the war in the Western desert was at its height.

PUPILS AND CLASSES FROM THE PAST THE EIGHTY- AND NINETY-YEAR OLDS



In the last issue we carried an appeal from **Geoff Patient** for news of any of his contemporaries from 1952/53 who would this year be reaching their eightieth birthdays with a view to holding a reunion to celebrate this achievement. Whilst there are still plans to get a table together at the Annual Dinner or some other gathering, we were delighted to welcome five of this group to our Christmas Coffee Morning and our picture shows Ben Cardwell, Roger Gaffney, Geoff himself, Brian Richardson and Edward Turner. Some had not met since leaving School and a happy time catching up was had by all, despite the troubled journeys those coming in on the A12 from Suffolk had had to endure whilst Chelmsford's traffic was equally unhospitable following an accident at the Army and Navy roundabout. Happily, the journeys home after a fish and chip lunch were far easier.

Ben Cardwell had previously supplied this information about himself: - "How interesting it was when I made contact about a possible reunion of my years at KEGs that I was asked if I had played any sport. I was not all that good at hand/eye coordination so the answer had to be no. But wait a minute, I came to the school late (3rd year in old money) and I also had to go to synagogue on a Saturday morning.

However, when older, I did play for Brentwood colts at rugby and I was a founder member of the KEGs Lions rugby team and arranged a match with Colchester Royal as I had gone to school there. In fact, it was me that suggested we call ourselves the Lions. (Not very original). I did go back once for a CCF reunion, I was a CSM, but there was nobody there that I knew.

One feature of my life at KEGs was the punishment regime. I knew the quad like the back of my hand as I was told to stand there so many times. I tried to ignore the looks I got from members of staff and other boys.

In those days there was detention on a Saturday morning. That meant a train journey for me. I lost my Geography exercise book. Boys used to stuff them down their socks to act as pads when playing games. Steadman had me in for a lot of lunch hours copying out somebody else's book. As you might imagine I did not choose geography for one of my options. I wasn't very good at completing my Latin homework and I do not remember how many tickets Pussy Johnson gave me. It was wondrous how he would slide up and plonk it on my desk. Those that had them might remember that each lesson for a whole week had to signed by the teacher who taught you and your parents had to sign that you had done your homework each night. My parents never saw the ticket as I would sneakily forge my father's signature.

And then, of course, there was the cane. I got it once for not wearing a tie! and another time because I was accused of being the ring leader in the disruption of Quirk's English classes. It wasn't the pain that distressed me, although Bruiser Findlay did not hold back, it was the humiliation. It can't all have been the fault of the school as KEGs was my fourth grammar school, having passed my 11+ in Hong Kong, from there to Colchester Royal and a year back home at Sullivan Upper School in Holywood, Northern Ireland. I was reprimanded in each one and I'm afraid it also happened at University. Strange that I went into teaching and was the caning deputy at a boys' secondary school and eventually became a school inspector!".

Ed Turner also made contact with Geoff: - "Having seen your item in the latest Newsletter, I felt I must write and make contact. I have to be honest that I cannot put a face to your name, but as you will agree, it has been 60+ years! Whilst you have remembered my name from Transitus days, I wonder whether you too can put a face to my name?

I have attended the OC's Annual Dinner for many years, and the only other regular attendee from our 'years' is Roger Gaffney, with intermittent appearances of Peter Woodward (Woody), who I met infrequently on business matters whilst in practice in Chelmsford. The same can be said of Richard Butt, for I had dealings with the firm of Butt, Reeve & Simpson. Jimmy Simpson died several years ago but Bryan Reeve is still with us.

My time in Transitus was short for this was the period that puberty set in and academic studies were not the most important thing on my mind! Although I enjoyed and did quite well in athletics (I won a House cap), I was useless at other sports, and completely put off boxing as Peter Pike showed the rest of the class how to get round a south-paw's defence (mine!). The remaining time at KEG's was unremarkable, and I left after the 5th Form.

Being the second of six children, my parents could not afford for me to go to University, so I remained in Chelmsford and joined Michael Copsey (ex KEGs) in his Chartered Surveying practice in Brentwood, where I stayed until I qualified and then moved on to Hilbery Chaplin in Romford as the Office Manager. Headhunted by two other property-based companies, and then a Developer as the Company Surveyor, until the property market went into chaos. After this I decided I had to work for myself and opened in Chelmsford with an existing practice as Partner in 1975. This was my life until I sold the business out in 2007, and became a man of leisure.

My contact with KEG's continued however, and I took Ray Knappet's place on the School's Management Governors, serving as Premises Governor for 17 years up to my retirement at the end of 2019. I wanted to see the last project, the Sports Centre, successfully completed, before standing down.

I never married, but have the benefit of the many nephews and nieces of my brothers and sisters - at least you can hand them back!

Please count on my support if you organise a re-union at Lawford Lane, and I shall be pleased to hear of any others of our age group that contact you. Also, to learn of your years between school and retirement!

Geoff, who had also heard from sports journalist **Martin Rogers** down under in Australia had contacted Ted and Ann Caton about attending the Christmas gathering adding 'I am 80 now, and as old friends pass on, it gives you the urgency to enjoy life in the company of our peer group, so I look forward to meeting you'.

He also replied to Ed:- What a pleasure to hear from you and your brief history, there always seems to be an affinity and common interests with our peer group, in spite of over 60 years lapse of infrequently seeing any of our 1953 intake at KEGS.

Like you my parents couldn't afford University for me and Nigel Fanshawe was not impressed when I left prematurely. My father managed Tom Green's pork butchers shop in Moulsham Street and my own early career was varied.

Port of London Authority at London Docks for 2 years, Bank of Australia for 2 years, local family garage in Hutton for 6 years and married the owner's daughter.

Subsequently I spent the next 40 years selling Cranes and Construction Equipment and was Sales Director for 20 of those years. During the 80s and 90s my Company were one of the sponsors of the Chelmsford Hockey Club where, amongst other OCs, I regularly met up with Roger Gaffney and Peter Woodward.

In retirement I enjoy my grandchildren and golf and look forward to meeting up at the OCs on December 15th.

Donald Kelly had written on receipt of the last newsletter saying how much he still enjoyed receiving and reading these, although with the regret that the names of those he recalled seemed to get fewer and fewer. He subsequently wrote "I was recently re-reading The Chelmsfordian from March 1945 and it reminded me of the Autumn Term 1944 when I was one of the new boys who joined 25 others in Form 1B. We'll all be in our late 80s now and soon to be celebrating our 90th birthdays so I'd be glad to hear through you from any other surviving class mates from that war time era.

By a strange coincidence we then heard from Judith Needham who wrote "I came across your website whilst looking up KEGS on behalf of my father-in-law, **Duncan Needham**, who was a pupil there in the 1940s. Now approaching his 90th birthday he often regales me with tales from those times and I'm sure he would be fascinated to receive your newsletter although I'm afraid he would require a paper copy if that is possible as he doesn't use a computer.

On checking our records, we discovered a W.D Needham at School from 1944-1950 with a home address at the time of The Homestead, Oxney Green, Writtle and replied to Judith of Don Kelly's current interest in hearing from class mates of the mid-forties, adding that we were still in touch with Brian Churcher and Peter Joslin, and sending on a copy of the Salvete pages of the 1944 intake that Donald referred to in the March 1945 Chelmsfordian. These included the likes of Ken Brewer, Willie Hunter and Gavin Morella who all played a part at the club together with Les Ketley and Ricky Richmond, both Past Presidents and stalwarts of the Association.

Judith confirmed that 'Duncan' was indeed 'Walter' although she was unsure when he started using his middle name and added that "Duncan's career was in teaching. He spent many years as bursar at Riddlesworth Hall school in Suffolk and a spell as an Ofsted inspector just before he retired. He lived in Suffolk for most of his adult life but is now in Deal on the Kent coast. He was married to Janet, a home economics teacher, for 56 years until her death in 2017. They had four children – three girls and a boy – and there are 7 grandchildren. Duncan's main hobby in retirement was building boats which he used to sail on the river Deben at Woodbridge. Duncan is looking forward to celebrating his 90th birthday in May 2023."



Having supplied these photos of Duncan as both schoolboy and as he is now, she suggested that he would really enjoy hearing from any of his contemporaries and that talking to someone from his childhood, after all these years, would be a wonderful thing for him.



KEEPING IN TOUCH


We are always pleased to hear from members and following our last newsletter had a global response with **Mike Madden** (1950-1954) enquiring from America if we still celebrate Guy Fawkes Day in England and on reading the last line of the October issue whether we have now taken to the American 'Merry' Christmas rather than the English 'Happy'.

Stephen Jeffers (1959-1965) wished us a Very Happy Christmas from beautiful Palm Springs, California suggesting that it was '74 degrees today and that thankfully the US midterm elections are over!'

Nigel Stuckey (1958-1964) confirmed he was Still here! in France with the only thing of note to report being 'the staggering news of the arrival of fibre to our sleepy hollow. From the 0.5 Mbps we have had to tolerate since the dinosaurs left, we now have 300 Mbps!! and Websites come up before I've even pressed the keys!'

Another of our members from overseas and living in New Zealand is **Steve Lowndes** who joined the School in the second year in 1959 and may be remembered by contemporaries as the Mildmay House Captain. He has sent us a copy of his book 'Travelling Light' which chronicles his various journeys around the world, initially on his own and then, after a chance meeting in 1969 at a dusty bus stop in Bolivia, a decade travelling with his new companion, Lisa Potts, through Pakistan, Russia, Greece, Turkey, Iran, America, Canada, Indonesia, Australia and more. A fascinating story from 'the days before credit cards, mobile phones or internet cafés, when the journey itself was the point of the experience, destinations being vaguely on the other side of the planet, and getting there simply taking as long as it takes. No plans, just you, your passport, a change of clothes and the appeal of the unknown, the thrill of taking on whatever tomorrow brings'.

Having settled in New Zealand during the winter of 1979, Steve has subsequently enjoyed a chequered career. Five years as a builder's labourer were followed by fourteen years as the director of the Akaroa Museum during which time he wrote three short histories of Akaroa, Banks Peninsula and the Hurunui. He then went into local government serving on various boards and councils and retired in 2019 as the Chairman of Environment Canterbury. Writing and painting have been Steve's twin recreations and he is currently working on another book, a biography of a man called Henry Head Alexander, who was born in Chippenham, travelled around the world seven times and spent many years in New Zealand before dying in Melbourne in 1925, aged 90





OBITUARIES

In the last issue we briefly mentioned the death in October of **Dave Matthews** (1952-1960) and in sending us the funeral details, Steve Little added that "I played much cricket with Dave on Saturdays and more so on Sundays and each year from 1975 to 1999 we played together in Terry Ketley's XI (of mainly OCs) against his local club near Maidstone. I kept wicket to Dave's bowling quite often and secured many a stumping!

He was the slowest left arm spinner I ever kept to or saw. He could bowl the normal spin ball but occasionally the Chinaman with a huge loop – the batsmen's eyes lit up as they charged at the ball which then spun the other way and yours truly had the easiest of stumpings. Dave, whilst a bachelor all the years I knew him, was very popular with the wives and girlfriends as well as his fellow players. A joy to be with and a thoroughly good bloke."

We have also heard from Duncan Bilney of the death last July of his father **C.A. Bilney** who attended the School from 1945-1950 and who had been a member since October 1950. He would appear to have stayed local all his life, his membership card showing his first address as North Avenue before moving to Beeches Road in Chelmsford and later to Maldon Road, Bicknacre and finally to 'Woodstock' in Woodham Ferrers.

Geoff Woods has kindly sent us these details about his father **John H Woods** (1945-1952) who died in June 2022.

"He grew up in Springfield and went to the Grammar School to the age of 18 as you know. After doing his national service, and after working in a bank for a short while, he got a job with the Essex River Board. He married my Mum in 1958 and moved to Cornwall in 1962, having got a job with the civil engineering contractor Gleasons. He worked as an engineer on a few jobs including Siblyback Reservoir on Bodmin Moor and Stithians Reservoir in west Cornwall, before landing a post with the Cornwall River Board as a land drainage engineer. He would work for them in their various guises – South West Water Authority and finally the Environment Agency – until he retired in 1993 at the age of 59.

He had a keen interest in the outdoors and particularly his garden. He was lucky to own a cottage on Bodmin Moor with an acre of mixed garden and woodland. He kept a rain gauge in his garden and sent rainfall measurements to the Met Office for several decades. He served on his local parish council for many years and had a keen interest in politics. He was a steward at Lawrence House Museum in Launceston, alongside Jake Jackson (see below). He also enjoyed painting.

He had a keen interest in sport (which he passed on to me) and played hockey and tennis at local club level. He liked hill walking and we spent hundreds of hours together walking on the moors or along the north Cornwall cliffs. He also enjoyed watching rugby and athletics on the telly and is survived by my Mum, Avril,



who still lives in the same house, my sister, Lisa (born 1962) and myself (born 1965).


In the picture attached, Dad is in the middle row on the far left – I think it was probably taken some time in the late forties. Among his friends at the Grammar School were the Courtman twins, Donald and Dudley, and Roger Leigh. Another ex-KEGS pupil and teacher living locally to Mum and Dad in Cornwall was 'Jake' Jackson. He is a couple of years younger than my dad and taught both me and my sister at Launceston College in the seventies. My sister is still in touch with him".

The Chelmsfordian records that John was awarded both 1st XI Hockey and 1st XI Football Colours whilst at

KEGs and from our memory, whilst living in Springfield, attended the Trinity Road Primary School.

At that time many of our members lived in the Hill Road/Queens Road/Trinity Road (which has recently received a makeover as a Healthy School Street) and the Springfield Park area and passed the 11+ exam from this school to move on to KEGs.

We are sure that many of these readers will be saddened to hear that the original kitchen and canteen buildings they once used, shown here to the front right of the playground, have recently been demolished to make way for the development of 2 new classrooms, a new kitchen and dining hall and a toilet block to enable a full two class entry of 60 children in the future.



We were sorry to hear from his wife Joy, that **Roger Bome** had died at the end of November. He had attended the school from 1948-1955 and it was possibly here, under Tom Wright, that his interest and life-long love for music started. He was a member of the Caprice Wind Orchestra which Joy had started and which is now run by their son David, who also attended KEGS from 1980-1982. Over the years, the orchestra has raised a huge sum of money for different national and local charities and for which Joy was awarded an MBE. Having handed the baton over to David, Joy then formed the All Saints Orchestra, centred on her home Springfield Church, for the benefit of local musicians, both wind and string, to play together and we were delighted to host the orchestra's inaugural concert at Lawford Lane in the Spring of 2016. This was not only a family affair with daughter Helen joining Joy, Roger and son David but had a strong KEGs connection too, with Peter Cross and Kathleen Tuckwell also performing whilst Brian Greatrex, with whom Roger had been at School, part of the behind-the-scenes team. Roger can be seen with violin on the extreme left in the window.



Until Roger's health began to fail, he and Joy were regular members of the club Coffee Morning group and during one of these meetings, discussion turned to the Schorndorf exchanges organised by Tom Wright, and Roger mentioned that he was in possession of a collection of photos, newspaper clippings and other items that had been kept over the years by **Graham Rogers.** He had been at KEGs from 1949-1955 and had been one of the party who went on the first concert trip to Germany in April/May 1954 and Roger subsequently submitted this piece for use in the newsletter.

"In the Spring of 1954, **Tom Wright**, a music and history teacher at the school, took 27 members of his senior orchestra, together with 14 girls of the High School choir, on a concert tour to Schorndorf and surrounding towns in southern Germany. They stayed with families in each of the eight towns in which they performed and it was an extremely hectic schedule but their concerts were very well received. The towns visited were Schorndorf, Aalen, Ulm, Nurtingen, Stuttgart, Goppinger, Neuffen, Winnenden, and Esslingen. This visit was to prove the first of regular exchange visits between KEGS and the Max Planck Gymnasium in Schorndorf which lasted some thirty plus years. My wife Joy (nee Sparrow) and I became very involved with this exchange when **Peter Cross** succeeded Tom as music master at the School and we still keep in touch with our friends in Germany.

Peter Cross was in turn succeeded by **David Sparrow** who was given numerous photos and press cuttings from this first visit and who passed them on to me as he thought they would be of more interest to Joy and myself. These I have now passed on to be kept at the OC's clubhouse in Lawford Lane so that others of you can look at them at some time.

As mentioned, this collection was compiled by **Graham Rogers**, who sadly died in November 2013, a Marconi man who went on this visit and I am sure many of you reading this article will remember him. I have been able to identify the following from the photos. Twiggy Wood, (to become ambassador in Vienna), Michael Cooper-Cox, (to become Head Boy), Jon Sachs, Walter Landers, Joe Clark, Dick Cable, Ian Middleton, Jim Foulkes and Connie Alderton, another member of staff."







As mentioned there were several press cuttings amongst this collection and the local newspaper reported that "Musically, socially and even internationally, this grand piece of pioneering work promoted by Mr Tom Wright, music master at the King Edward VI School, was an unqualified success."

Another cutting headed "German Mother Wept as British Children Played Anthem" suggested that one of the most prized mementoes bought back from the trip by Tom Wright was a letter written by a German mother who had attended one of the concerts in Stuttgart "I was present yesterday evening at your concert. I don't want to say anything about your music, which, as it came from you to me, gave me the very greatest pleasure. It is hard for me to find words to express what I want to say. I have not heard the German national anthem since the end of the war, and last night I heard it for the first time again, played by an English orchestra. I was not ashamed of my tears, and I must say I feel full of hope that on the basis of music a real understanding between the nations would be possible"

Tom spent his entire working life at KEGs having initially been appointed in September 1930, after leaving Oxford University with a good Honours degree in Modern History, "to teach History and German and to be form master of Vb". He retired in 1968 having laid the very strong foundations of music at KEGs and retained his interest in the School and its music until his death in 1990. He is still fondly remembered by the many hundreds of boys he taught and inspired, especially by those he introduced to music.

From this collection, which included Graham's Identity Card for the trip, we read that a total of 13 concerts were given in the 8 towns to a total audience of more than 5000 children and adults and that the whole tour was a huge success.

TABLE TENNIS

<u>Chelmsford District Table Tennis League – 2022/23 Season</u>

The main Chelmsford League season has just passed its halfway point and we have some very encouraging news to report concerning our A Team in Division 1.

Having not won the top division in the Chelmsford League since 1994/95, the A Team currently sit top of the league by a clear 19 points having won 9 out of the 11 matches they have played. The three main players in the squad all have spectacular win percentages. Matthew Mulley remains unbeaten having won all 21 matches he has played, brother Mark has won 90% of his games, and Paul Lucas 89%. If these three players remain fit and available for the remainder of the season then the A Team should become champions for the first time in 28 years.

Our two teams in Division 2 continue to perform contrary to expectations. The stronger B Team squad is currently bottom of the 12-team league and are 8 points from safety. Gareth Joice (67%), Berti Makoli (62%), and Kevin Worthington (58%) all have excellent win records but have not played in enough games for this to have materially affected the teams league position. If these players can turn out more in the second half of the season, then the B Team should have a good chance of avoiding relegation.

By contrast, the C Team in Division 2 is comfortably mid-table (6th of 12) largely due to the exploits of everpresent Mick Richardson who has a highly creditable win rate of 68% in the first half of the season.

In Division 3 the D Team have pushed themselves into promotion contention by winning their last three games. Richard Baxter is their leading player (81%) and is admirably supported by Tom Barker (55%) and Richard Upson (50%).

Our remaining two teams both compete in Division 4. The E Team is currently 5th of 10 thanks mainly to the consistency of Farooq Ahmed (81%) and David Newman (56%). However, the E team is in a relegation fight and is currently one place above the relegation places in 8th with only 1 point more than the Hatfield Peverel D Team in 9th. David Bishop (62%) is vital to this team's hope of survival.
