

The OARS' officer team has been looking for a venue for our Christmas meeting. Our usual spot, Tugboat Annie's banquet room, is not available to us in December—unless we pay a \$250 rental charge and use their buffet food service, and guarantee 30 or more attendees. The cost of an entree at this event will depend somewhat on the collective food choice but varies between \$22 and \$34, before drinks, tax, and tip.

We talked about this on the Information Net a week ago. Four members offered to pay the \$250 and 13 people put their names in as wanting to come, so without inviting the whole club membership we are well on the way toward having our Christmas event at Tugboats'!

Several points were made that further our enthusiasm for staying at Tugboat's, the most important being that we haven't been paying rent to meet at Tugboat's whereas we were in the \$100 a meeting range at the Event Center on North Street in Tumwater, a cost which was wrecking our budget. REMEMBER THOSE DAYS BY FRANK HAMILTON, KF7HXV

I was in the U.S. Air Force and for the end of my first tour they sent me to remote Alaska. The site was Clear Air Force Station. A near-by guard shack was known as White Alice. The old system that it was built for was long gone. What we were doing now was guarding an antenna field. For heat, the shack had one Yankee Heater in the wall – Didn't do much good when the temperature was -80 degrees inside and out.

The RCA Service Company furnished our radios. They were commercial not government. They were on two meter channels. So were the Russians. I started up a conversation with several of my counter parts over there. What I was doing got discovered by superiors a couple of months later. I got sent to the commander's office. The colonel just wanted to make sure I was not discussing classified information. | reassured him | was not. Conversations were back on.

The mess hall was open 24/7. They had a standing offer that they would cook any game meet we brought in. I asked the cook if I could have some moose. He said only if you shoot it! I said how do I do that. The cook said you have to have a guide. Where's a guide? The cook pointed to an old guy sitting by himself. I asked what it would take to go moose hunting. He knew I was a Gl. He said: A halfgallon of whiskey, meet me at 0700 tomorrow out front. I did.

The guide pulled up out front as planned. He had an early 50's Plymouth station wagon. Running it didn't sound good. He said get in. I did. We drove about 15 miles to a plowed road. He stopped in the middle. It was about -40 degrees and the snow was about 15 feet high on the sides of the road. We sat there about three hours. Nothing! There were two dirty coffee cups on the dash. He said you want a drink? I said no I have not shot yet. I was about to give up and a moose came out of a hole in the snow.

I carefully pulled my 300 Weatherby out of the back seat. The passenger's door was open and I was going to use it for a bench rest. It was shacking so badly I told the old boy to shut the car off. The critter was only about 75 feet away. One shot to the heart dropped him where he stood.

I said to the guide: What now? He went to the tailgate and opened it. He got out a chain saw and set it down by the animal. I asked what are you doing? He said when beast begins to freeze we can quarter him. We have to do that so he'll fit in the car.

SO WHAT'S A RALLY? BY FRANK HAMILTON, KF7HXV

This is primarily written for those who have not helped out at an auto rally also known as a stage rally. Working a rally is fun and you just may learn a new skill.

Handicapped? Don't let that slow you down. There are several things you can do.

Competitors operate smaller vehicles divided into stages. Stages may range from a mile or so up to 20+ miles. Each stage is almost its own race.

There is a timing crew that times the total elapse time each car takes. The times are added together at the end of the day to determine who the daily winner is. Rallies may last up to three days in duration. Drivers are grouped together according to history and driving experience.

Each competitor has a codriver. The co-driver reads the route map to the driver as they proceed through the course at speed. Cars have been known to reach speeds up to 120 mph. There are no secret stages.

Factory cars are those that are set up at the factory as race cars. They have little or no modification. Any of the cars are allowed to be modified. When they arrive they must be scrutinized (inspected). Cars are grouped based on horse power and the driver's experience (history). This determines the starting order.

The stage captain manages the stage. Volunteers will be asked to sign a waiver. This puts you on the rally's insurance.

Your stage captain will assign you to a post. If you have special needs tell him/her. You may be asked to sit in your vehicle and help with inventory of competitors as they go by. This is important because if the "Start" passed point A and didn't get to point B, they may have crashed. Other jobs are helping out at "Start". It is most helpful if you contact the stage manager a few days before the event, so you can be assigned a position and you'll know where you will be located. It takes at least two hams per stage. Long stages or those with cross roads or lots of curves take more hams.

Once you have been posted, you are there for the day. You can not leave your post except for a medical emergency. Notify the stage captain as she/he must shut the stage down so you don't get hit by a car doing 120 mph. It's a good idea to bring the right dress and a sack lunch with you. Some rallies have night stages and you will know that ahead of time. If you are assigned to a cross-road, your job will be to insure no unauthorized people or vehicles enter the "hot" stage. The stage captain will send out a notice when the stage is hot and when it goes cold. You may have to relay.



The stage captain will designate a rendezvous location each morning. Members of the stage will assemble there for assignment and final instructions. When that's done the captain will lead you to your post. The time and place of this meeting will be set by the stage captain.

Come and help out. You will probably enjoy it. Great bunch of folks to have as friends. I have been involved with rallies since about 1982. Rallies are held on Green Diamond property north of Shelton. Olympus in the spring draws competitors from around the world and in September is a regional rally.


