SO YOU PASSED YOUR TEST . . .

You passed the test, you have your brand-new call sign, what's next?

What do we, OARS & TCARES, do with all these new hams?

We treat them with respect and offer them all the help that they need to become successful in whatever facet of this vast hobby that they choose to pursue.

Like anything new, there is a steep "learning curve" where they may get frustrated and lose interest.

This is where we, as OARS and TCARES members, come in.

We need to make sure that each new ham that comes out of Klaus' VE testing sessions knows that they have a vast resource of information and assistance to help them on their way. "You don't know what you don't know" and we are here to teach you what we know.

There is a lot of new technology coming out in new radios and peripherals and the new hams will have a distinct advantage over us older hams in that they haven't learned any bad habits, yet, like wanting a radio with a thousand knobs and switches instead of one that is totally computer controlled, or using an SWR meter instead of a VNA to check your antenna.

So, you now have this piece of paper with your call sign, what's next?

Purchase a new or used handheld radio and get on the air. There are lots of places to purchase a radio, Ham Radio Outlet (www.hamradio.com) probably has the best prices on new gear, check QRZ.com's Swapmeet for good deals on used equipment. A radio, coax, antenna, and power supply can be purchased for under \$300. This is a small investment, and it will help you decide which of the many directions you can go within this hobby. Program the radio with the OARS repeater frequencies;

 VHF: 147.360 MHz, +offset, 103.5 pl or CTCSS tone encode only, UHF: 441.400 MHz, +offset, 103.5 pl or CTCSS te encode only, and join in the fun on your radio.

Nets begin at 7:00 PM (19:00) every Tuesday evening with the TCARES (Thurston County Amateur Radio Emergency Service) Information Net followed at 19:30 with the OARS (Olympia Amateur Radio Society) Information Net on all of the OARS repeaters. You are welcome to check-in as a visitor on the TCARES Net and everyone is welcome to check-in on the OARS net.

You start your ham radio life as a Technician, and you are limited to VHF/UHF and above. This is not really a limitation, there are lots of activities on these bands for you to enjoy. Some of ham radio's most exciting accomplishments have occurred on these bands, we bounce radio signals off the moon, we make contacts "QSO's" through orbiting satellites, we talk with the astronauts on the International Space Station, we experiment with

basic radio telescopy, and much, much more. These higher frequencies are home to many experimenters and DIY'ers, there is a whole world out there for you to explore.

How to become a "successful" ham radio operator:

- 1. Join OARS, the Olympia Amateur Radio Society, http://www. olyham.org. You can even join OARS before you get your license and get a jump start on your enjoyment of this hobby.
- 2. Determine your equipment budget, converse with the approving authority (XYL, significant other, etc.?)
- 3. Understand the limits of of the Chinese brands as your license. You don't need a license to listen, and listening is 90% of what we do on the radio. You must be licensed to transmit. If you are a Technician class licensee you basically have VHF/ UHF privileges as described above, upgrading to General or Extra Class will expand your privileges exponentially.

- 4. Determine what you want to do in this vast hobby; mobile, QRP, DX'ing, contesting, building antennas, emergency communications, (join TCARES, www.wa7oly. org), etc. This will help to decide what type of radio equipment you will consider purchasing.
- 5. Do your research, ask questions ("the only dumb question is the one you didn't ask"), make mistakes, learn new things.
- 6. Get on the air! Check in operator for over 45 to the Tuesday evening nets on 147.360 MHz + 103.5, attend the monthly OARS meetings, info at http://www.olyham.org
- 7. Start with a good dual band handheld, be wary some are not FCC certified. A good dual band HT will work fine both mobile and in the house, make sure you have a good antenna for both locations. Good additions for the HT are an external 73's (ham radio term for spkr/mic and an improved antenna to replace the stock rubber duck "dummy load".

- 8. Expand your equipment inventory to suit your operating habits and your budget, don't forget the approving authority!
- 9. Above all, HAVE FUN!!!

Hopefully I have dispelled some fears and answered some questions, if you have any further questions just ask any OARS or TCARES member and we will at least point you in the right direction.

I have been a ham radio years (1st licensed in 1978 as KA7FRZ), some have been hams for longer than that. There is a reason that we stick with this hobby. It is very rewarding, challenging, frustrating and confusing, but when we get together we can solve almost any radio-related problems. This is why we call it a ham radio community, it's more than just getting on the radio.
